PREVIEW: Area Talent is Deep, Varied

This cross country season is still at such an early stage that many teams have yet to compete.

But with the season barely underway, a number of teams and individual runners have already set the tone for what promises to be an extremely competitive year.

For the first time in years, there is no dominant individual such as Milena Glusac or Mebrahtom Keflezighi.

But there is an abundance of quality programs and strong talent across the board.

A number of teams are poised to make a run at state titles or are looking for high state rankings.

On the boys side, Chula Vista and Scripps Ranch both have all their runners returning from teams that won their divisions in the CIF meet last year. They rank 1-2 in the first coaches' poll of the year.

Torrey Pines is already the most highly regarded girls team. Off last year's results, the Falcons had to be rated as a strong team, but early season results have confirmed that they have an abundance of quality.

It's not an off year for the traditional powers either. Rancho Bernardo, Mt. Carmel, Poway, El Capitan, Vista, West Hills and Ramona all have talented boys and girls teams.

And there are intriguing teams like Hoover's boys that can run with anybody.

Individually, Bonita Vista's Clare Becker is several steps ahead of her girls competition. She won the CIF Division I race last year and finished 8th at the State meet.


Every CIF girls champ returns. In addition to large school leader Becker, there is Stephanie Nelle, of Valhalla (Division II), Michelle O'Connor, of Our Lady of Peace (Division III), and Jessica Lunt, of Coronado (Division IV).

There is plenty to back them up, too. Division I returns seven top ten runners, including the top four. Division II has eight girls back from the top ten, including the top three. And Division III also sees eight of the top ten girls return.

There is another impressive group of freshman girls, too, at schools like Torrey Pines, Vista, West Hills and Ramona, among others.

San Pasqual's Manuel Romero is the fastest state meet entrant returning among the boys, with his 15:44 at Fresno, but

there is plenty of talent right on his heels.

Scripps' Kevin Bowes and David Romero, Ramona's Shilo Glass, Vista's Trevor Sybert and Chula Vista's Ruben Carrillo all finished under 16 minutes at Fresno, and Hoover junior Ayub Abdusalam (16:02) can run with any of those runners.

Mt. Carmel's Greg Nett, El Camino's Tom Kloos, Grossmont's David McQuitty, Mira Mesa's Larry Henderson, Helix' Kevin Chappell and a number of runners from Scripps Ranch, Vista and Rancho Bernardo have all been running well.

In girls races, Becker still has a decided edge. But there is quality in virtually every corner of the county.

Mt. Carmel's Melanie Pickett, Mira Mesa's Mariel Gray, Fallbrook sisters Jinna and Sharon

Fast Start for Torrey's Girls, Abdusalam

Hoover junior Ayub Abdusalam and the Torrey Pines girls team have been two success stories in cross country in early season invitational action.

Abdusalam has three wins in three meets, and the Torrey girls look strong.

At press time, four invitationals had been held in this area, and many teams have been to meets in Las Vegas, Irvine and Laguna Hills. Dual meet action has been sparse.

At the West Hills Invitational, on September 3, Abdusalam and Ramona's Veronica Clark had the

Results of the Vaquero Stampede, held the same day, were incomplete, but Mira Mesa's Larry Henderson edged Grossmont's David McQuitty in the race of the day.

Abdusalam was impressive at the Bronco Roundup on September 10, winning handily over McQuitty. Torrey's Devon Straitiff paced the girls.

The competition was considerable tougher on Sept. 17 at the Mt. Carmel/Movin' Shoe Invitational.

A number of western powerhouse schools dropped in to race there, including state champion teams Thousand Oaks (Boys, Div. I), and Jesuit of Carmichael, (Boys, Div. II).

Brent Strahan, from Hart (Newhall), was the fastest boy on the day, while Kim Mortensen of Thousand Oaks ran the fastest girls time.

Bonita Vista's Clare Becker won by a big margin in the large girls senior race, and the fastest local boy runner was Vista's Trevor Sybert.

The ever-present Abdusalam cruised in his race, winning by 13 seconds over McQuitty, who used a strong last 800 meters to moved up several positions.

Torrey Pines girls placed high in the large school races, while Ramona's girls were among the leaders in every small school race.

But, as a coach at Julian High School (with Bill Porter) for the last five years, I got a good, eye-opening, close-up look at local track and cross country.

I began to appreciate the real strength of this area: its coaches. Its a different generation of mentors now, and it's a group that is now in their prime. Many of them grew up in this area and learned from a previous generation of venerated teachers that are still talked about.

This "second wave" of coaches seems to me to be at the heart of what I see as a new peak of interest in track and cross country locally. This could be the time of coming-of-age for our sports.

The past was undeniably great, but I think there are more strong programs here than ever before. There is tremendous interest, even it is sort of an underground scene with a cult following.

That's where I come in. I don't promise to make you all famous, but I will provide the kind of coverage I think our sports deserve. Track Magazine will eventually find its audience.

My name is Buzz Thom, and I have been lucky enough to witness a lot of our history as an athlete, as a fan, as a journalist and as a coach.

But my calling has always been journalism. I have been a writer, a photographer, an editor and, in recent years, an editor-publisher.

The resume includes jobs ranging from sports editor of the Chula Vista Star-News in 1964-1965 to my own creation, The Julian News, which I owned and edited in the 1980s.

My love, however, has always been

my ambition to combine the two interests. I never passed up the opportunity to write about track or cross country, even if it was sometimes a bit of a stretch.

Somewhere there is a retired college professor who still shakes his head when he recalls my college Freshman English research paper. It was titled King Lear and Track and Field.

As a fan and longtime observer, I can't wait to see what happens next. It will be a great pleasure to record the next chapters of the rich pageant that is San Diego cross country and track and field.

Torrey Pines Girls: Team Has it 'Together'

Torrey Pines coach Brent Thorne has always been a big fan of the team concept in cross country.

A perfect example was last year's CIF Championships, where his Falcons finished second to El Capitan, in the Division II girls race.

Despite not placing a runner in the top ten, Torrey totaled only 77 points to pull off a state meet berth. If you add places 11 through 15, you get 65. Get it?

This year, Torrey Pines still has the pack, only it is a new and much improved version.

On paper, Thorne had his 1-2-3-4-7 girls back from the team that finished 10th at Fresno last year.

To that mix, he has added Devon Straitiff, third in last year's CIF 1600 meters (in 5:15), and a great crop of freshmen.

They put on an impressive display at last week's Mt. Carmel Invitational at Morley Field.

Straitiff, a junior, was second in her race, running 15:59 for the 2.5 miles course. Sandy Rabie. last year's team leader, was second in the senior race, clocking 16:16. But it was the freshmen who were the talk of the meet.

In the large schools freshman girls race, the Falcons placed second, third, fifth and eighth. No team standings were tabulated, but Torrey was clearly the class of the field.

Hart of Newhall's head coach shook his head in amazement when he viewed the results.

"Oh, they must be used to this course," he told his assistant. "Yeah, they're just used to running here."

Sorry, coach. The last time any of these girls was in Balboa Park, they were probably at the Zoo. Eighth-graders don't get many races at Morley.

The freshmen, who are hard to separate (that team thing, you know), were Bethany Bogart, second in 16:44; Danielle Valentino, third in 16:49; Jaclyn Nolan, fifth in 16:54; and Becca Instone, eighth in 17:24.

Torrey Pines' embarrassment of riches don't seem to end. Kristin Roth was a super frosh last year, running 19:45 for 5K at Fresno and taking fourth in the CIF 800 meters (at 2:18.4).

Senior Carrie Hemerick was in the "top three or four" on last year's team before an injury. She's back and running strong She was ninth in the Mt. Carmel senior girls, in 16:40.

Other placers at Mt. Carmel last week included Sarah Pearcy, 12th junior, at 17:22, and Sara McManus, 20th sophomore, at 18:02. Both were key members of the Falcons last year. In track, Pearcy was the Avocado League runner-up in the 3200 meters, at 11:55.

Straitiff is new to cross country and is a relative newcomer to distance running of any kind.

"Last year, she played club soccer," Thorne remembered.

"In track, I always thought of her as a sprinter. But she came up to me (in the spring) and asked to be allowed to run distance. She told me, 'I enjoy running.' " Her relative lack of experience and background make last year's 3rd in the CIF 1600 impressive.

Another newcomer to the sport is junior Erin Burke, who played volleyball last year. She was a 2:30 800-meter runner.

Thorne thinks Kristin Branson, a sophomore who was the number eight runner last year, has the ability to make a big step to the next level. "She runs a 61second 400 meters, and about a 2:20 800," Thorne said. "She might be one of my best runners by end of the year."

"I've been very lucky," Thorne said. "I don't know why I've gotten all these good runners at the same time. They are a real bunch of thoroughbreds."

"We're still just doing basic training," he said. "The girls think we should be doing more speed work right now, but it's a long season and patience is a virtue."

Goals? In CIF, Thorne is keeping an eye on Scripps Ranch and especially El Capitan.

"Last year we were ahead of them at this time of the season," Thorne said. "But they placed three girls ahead of our number one runner at CIF (and won the title). Bill Cleves (the El Cap coach), is absolutely one of the

best coaches in the county."

Then Thorne returned to the team theme.

"We don't talk about individuals at all," he said. "Everything is geared to get as many girls to the mile mark together as possible. It's a good group, and the seniors are all inclusive of everybody. We have girls who lead by example."

And girls who race very fast.

Scripps Ranch Team: Boys Aiming High, Girls Surprise

Is it deja vu for Scripps Ranch coach Bob Oliver?

Try this scenario: a brand new school, with a campus located on the mesas north of the San Diego central city. There was instant success for a cross country team that came, almost as a group, from a nearby rival school. There was success at the state level.

Did you think I was talking about Scripps Ranch last year?

After all, in their first year of existence, and without a senior class of students, Scripps was wildly successful.

But the reference was to an earlier, nearly identical, success story. This year marks the 30year anniversary of the 1964 Mesa College cross country team.

That team, at a newly-created community college, won the state championship. Their roster included some local legends, such as Bill Trujillo, Rich Cota, Bob Hose and current Scripps coach Bob Oliver.

For a team that has high ambitions like Scripps, the anniversary could be an omen.

Okay, enough ancient history. Time for current events. If you

slept through last year, it happened like this.

Scripps Ranch was carved out of the Mira Mesa enrollment area. The Marauders had just won the large-school CIF boys title two years in a row.

By chance, nearly all of the returning boys varsity runners lived in the Scripps area: instant team!

Oliver had them coming on strong at the finish last year. They beat Mission Bay in the Western League finals, although the Bucs were missing key runners.

They then beat St. Augustine and West Hills to win the CIF Division III race and proceeded to finish second at the state level.

Now that the school has added seniors, Scripps has moved up to Division II. The competition will be tougher, but the team is still focused on a big effort at Fresno.

To that end, Scripps has been looking for tough races. They've gone head-to-head with Vista, Chula Vista and Rancho Bernardo in the early season. Oliver asked

Brief Looks at What's New at Area's Schools

Ramona High's girls team must be wondering what they have to do to attract attention in the coaches' poll. The Bulldog boys are placed sixth in the latest ratings, but the girls are nowhere to be found.

Maybe the raters missed Ramona's impressive showing at the Mt. Carmel/Movin' Shoe Invitational last week.

In Division II, Ramona placed their top girl no lower than fourth in each of the grade level races.

For the record, they took first, third, 10th and 18th in the freshman race; they placed second in the sophomore race; were fourth in the junior race; and were fourth in the senior race.

No other small school ranked so well across the board. San Pasqual, La Jolla, Carlsbad, Bishop's, Hilltop, Helix, Scripps Ranch, Santana and Sweetwater were among Ramona's rivals at the meet.

You think it's been hot where you are? Try running in Borrego Springs, where the local high school will field a team this year. Coach John Quirk has five boys and two girls working in the desert heat. "The first few workouts were in 108-degree heat," he said. "After that, we decided to run just before sundown." Quirk's squad is comprised of novice runners and he's bringing them along slowly. Running in the desert is not without its rewards, however. "We were running a workout in Hellhole Canyon," Quirk said, "and a group of runners encountered six Bighorn Sheep. Running is not just about competition. Our kids are also getting the aesthetics of it."

Scripps Ranch will never be accused of not seeking good competition in the early season.


Coach Bob Oliver's squad has already ran a dual with Vista and a tri-meet with Chula Vista and Rancho Bernardo, which was Wednesday.

The team also entered the large schools competition at the Mt. Carmel/Movin' Shoe Invitational senior race.

San Dieguito High has lost star runner Amy Haase.

Haase, a junior, moved to Indianapolis. Last year, as a sophomore, Haase ran 1600 meters in 5:00.2 and was the CIF champ at 3200 meters (10:51.4).

It is unclear if Haase will continue to pursue her running career in the Midwest. San Dieguito coach Matt Cunningham indicated that Haase may elect to play soccer, which is a fall sport in Indiana. Haase was a noted multisport talent while at San Dieguito, and, in fact, passed up a chance to compete in the CIF 1600 so she could race in a swim relay at the CIF swim championships, held the same day.

Shannon O'Connor has transferred from Our Lady of Peace to La Jolla High School.

O'Connor, who is now a sophomore, was a key member of OLP's CIF Division III champs last year. Ironically, La Jolla was the runner-up to OLP in that meet.

O'Connor was second in the Harbor League finals, finishing behind sister Michelle O'Connor. She later ran 19:38 for 5K at the State Meet in Fresno, and was the third girl from the San Diego Section to finish in the Division III race.

Santa Fe Christian has officially dropped cross country this year, after fielding a team for the last two years. Coach Sherri Svendsen is no longer working at Santa Fe.

Athletic Director Clark Gilbert pulled the plug on the harriers. "He just told me it was because of intangibles," Svendsen said.

Svendsen, who was also the school's track coach, took an individual qualifier to Fresno in 1992.

La Jolla High might have the county's largest team. Vikings field 84 athletes.

Coach Chuck Boyer's boys team has 30 runners, while girls coach Tom Dorman has 54 on his roster at last count.

Julian High returns ace Todd Lewis, who is gearing up for a run at qualifying for the state meet for the fourth year in a row.

Lewis has moved up in the CIF standings each year, and was fourth in Division IV last fall. Coach Bill Porter, now in his sixth year at Julian, related that Lewis has, for the first time, trained during the summer.

Last year's number two runner, Aaron Voss, also returns. Porter expects a big improvement from Voss, who last spring ran track for the first time and also kept in shape over the summer months.

At Army-Navy Academy, first-year coach Eddie Magwood will probably field a team that will contend for the Southern Conference title.

The team has a pair of aces in junior Robert Frailing, fifth in the league last year, and senior Jason Tullius, who was a close second in the league's 1600 meters in track.

Providing depth will be a new face, freshman Dan Nitta, who Magwood reports has been pushing the top two in practices.

The all-boys school has 16 runners on the squad. They are awaiting their first competition.

Our Lady of Peace and St. Augustine have been moved into the already tough Western League this year.

The two schools were dominant in the Harbor League last year. In the boys race, St. Augustine runners took the first four spots in the league's championship meet, and five of the top seven overall.

OLP also blitzed the competition in the league finals. They placed eight girls in the top ten, including the top two and six of the first seven.

Tri-City Christian always struggles to field a team (they are the smallest school in the county to compete in cross country), but always has quality.

Defending league champ Ryan Swanson returns for his senior year. "He seems much stronger this year," coach Lee Swanson said. "He was disappointed in how he finished up last year." Swanson became ill just before the CIF meet last year and finished tenth. Coach Swanson has three other "serious runners" this year and traditionally fills out his squad with basketball players in training.

Standout Vista freshman Natalie Forsyth attended Tri-City for years before finally transferring.

La Jolla Country Day also has a new coach in Pat Wagner. He's building from scratch, with only returning runner from last year. While former Torre Ty Stewart romps for Scripps Ranch, Wagner is building a base. He has eleven runners, all boys. At the Mt. Carmel Invite, a freshman, Noah Lidman, was 17th in the Division II Boys Freshman race, in 18:47.

Calvin Christian's boys program suffered a significant loss for the second year in a row. Last year, defending league champion Mike Aldrink moved to Florida for his senior year. Now, Calvin must deal with the loss of last year's number one and two runners, twins Erin and Brian O'Connor, who have transferred to San Pasqual.

The O'Connors, who are juniors, led the team to the league championship last year, finishing second and third in the loop's championships. They then helped the Crusaders to second in the CIF Meet, as Erin was second and Brian was sixth.

Coach Linda Marcus, now in her third year, does return four of last year's top five, and the school has a tradition of being a strong presence by season's end.

Marcus expects Jacob Young, 10th in the league last year, to step up to the number one slot. Nathan Hall, Jason Phillips and Doug Kok are other veterans of last year's state meet qualifiers.

Calvin's roster numbers 18 boys and 7 girls.

Sophomore Leslie DeJager has made a big jump in ability this year after a good summer of training. "She's a lot stronger this year," Marcus said.

Sarah Schmidt, a junior, was fifth in the Section 3200 last May, running 11:31 as a sophomore. She's a legitimate talent.



West Hills currently allows open enrollment within the Grossmont High School District, and has reportedly increased their numbers significantly.



The Vaqueros won their division last year, beating Torrey Pines.


From that team they return the top three plus two others from the group of seven that was sixth in the state.




