

The kids are alright

This is a strong year for the San Diego Section in cross country.

A number of the area's best individual runners have legitimate aspirations at the state level, and beyond. The best of the best also have a chance to contend at the Footlocker Regionals.

Some of the area's best teams are taking aim at state titles -- it's going to be fun around here.

Jason Finch, a Granite Hills senior, has a great chance to win the state's Division I title. In Division II, Ramona's Matt McInvale and Serra's Marcus Chandler are legit threats for the state championship.

Francis Parker's Angela Petersen and Hilltop's Desiree Davila both were state runners-up last year (in Divisions V and II, respectively), and should contend again. Helix senior Courtney Baird has been the most impressive local girl this season, and she will be a

factor in the state's Division I race.

Teams that might stir things up at the state level are the La Jolla boys (in Division III) and the University City girls (also in Division III).

Whichever boys and girls teams eventually emerge as the champions of Division I at the local CIF meet will also be strong contenders at Fresno.

It will also be fun to watch all the local infighting among dozens of excellent local runners, especially at the invitational meets.

The talented runners of the boys class of 2000 are now juniors, and they are ready to make waves. They include McInvale, Rancho Bernardo's Sean Ricketts, West Hills' Evan Fox, Vista's Justin Neuroth, Monte Vista's Jon Rankin, Fallbrook's Efrain Casarez, and more.

Those kids are alright, too.



Division: One. Coach: Dennis McClanahan. Assisted by John Rankin and Nathan Boyer. Course: on campus.


BOYS:

Numbers: 35. Returning: Arnel Aradanas, 12; Chris Kenyon, 11. They are the only remnants from last year's strong varsity. Kenyon was the team's best runner at the Bronco Invite. The new pack: McClanahan has a group of juniors that have enjoyed success on the way up. They were one of the county's best frosh teams two years ago, and last year they formed the core of an undefeated junior varsity squad. Now, they'll be the nucleus of the varsity. Look for Sergio Esquivel, 11; Mike Klepper, 11; Mike Zahalan, 11; Mike Cooke, 11; Alan Aradanas, 9; and Greg Ryan, 12 to take varsity slots. "I had about six kids that ran from 10:15 to 10:45 as sophs last year," McClanahan said. He tabbed Esquivel and Klepper as the front runners of this group (Kenyon, another junior, was on the varsity last fall). Ryan was a good miler for McClanahan, but is trying cross country for the first time. Frosh Aradanas has a lot of talent.

The outlook: A real darkhorse team. The league's coaches collectively breathed a sigh of relief when Mike Baskin and his mates picked up their diplomas, but Mt. Carmel won't take long to get it going again. "We could be a year away," McClanahan said, "but this is the type of team that can come on real strong at the end of the year." The Sundevils are not the league favorite, but they will stir things up. The basic core of talent is very good, and the question is: when will they arrive?

GIRLS:

Numbers: 35. The best: Karen Vasko, 11. She is an excellent runner that ranks just behind the league's very best. Her strength at the top of the roster gives the team some nice balance. In track, she ran the 1600 in 5:12. The pack: Ashley Dere, 10; Janet Mulvey, 10; Manal Yamout, 10; Kim Nessell, 10; Megan Lyons, 10;

Audrey Harrer, 10; Veronica Roberts, 12; Michelle Dos Santos, 12. This group has some talent. Roberts, Nessell and Mulvey were all on last year's varsity. In track, Mulvey ran 11:49; Yamout ran 12:10; Dere ran 12:12; and Lyons ran 12:15. Harrer is an all-around athlete trying running for the first time. In her first racing attempt, she won the JV race at the Bronco Invite. Roberts and Dos Santos are the team captains, along with Vasko. "We have pretty good depth," McClanahan said.

The outlook: They could easily be one of the county's top ten teams. Vasko is a very good team ace, the depth is there, and McClanahan always brings the team around at the right time. They may not be among the county's top four or five teams right now, but they are at the top of the list of teams that might push their way into that group.

Poway

Division: One. Coach: Dan Schaitel. Assisted by Mark Embrey. Course: Lake Poway.

BOYS:

Numbers: 50. The leader: Josh Pope, 11. He was the team's first finisher in the first two meets, and he is the only member of the top five to return. As a frosh, he was part of that surprise second-place State Meet team of 1996. "He's emerged as a leader," Schaitel said. "He's taken over in workouts." Right behind: returning from last year's varsity group are Josh Long, 12; and Reis Paluso, 11. Both are improved. Not far back: The pack also includes Aaron Powell, 10; Devin Lyons-Quirk, 10; Seth Dallman, 12; Tim Helms, 11; Pat Prunty, 11; and Jason Smith, 11. Powell and Lyons-Quirk got notice in the spring with good frosh track efforts. Powell ran 1:59 for 800, and Lyons-Quirk clocked 9:57 for 3200, both excellent ninth-grade marks. Helms and Prunty were JV runners last year, but are much improved; Smith is a transfer from Arizona. Depth: The numbers (fifty) are not just bodies; the quality drops off very gradually. Nobody is deeper.

The outlook: Last year's CIF championship team was senior-dominated, but the rebuilding was well underway during track season, when Schaitel was developing young talents like Powell and Lyons-Quirk, both now key pack members. It's a younger

en), but there doesn't seem to be much dropoff. Pope has stepped up to be a solid number one, and a busload of guys are breathing down his neck. At the Bronco Invite, Poway had a 0:37-second spread from one to five, and only West Hills got their fifth man across faster. That's the kind of fast-moving pack that spells trouble for opponents. Put them solidly in the county's top ten teams, for starters, and expect them to improve.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 60. The leaders: There are a number of girls who could be the best at various times. Kamaya Damwijk, 10, is the team's fastest returner. She's a 2:22 800-meter runer. Megan Briscoe, 10, didn't run cross country as a frosh, but in track turned in a 5:15 effort, and she was the team's best at Bronco. And there's Brianna Hibbs, 11, who was the team leader as a frosh (also running a 5:07 for 1600), who battled injuries last year. She seems healthy now. The pack: Britt Jennings, 11; Mande Clark, 12; Amber Smith, 10. These three also seem key to the team effort. Jennings is a 2:24 800 runner; Clark timed 5:33 and 12:09 during track; and Smith ran the 1600 in 5:22. Depth: Mucho depth: Julia McGurk, 11; Arlene Collier, 12; Meredith Nespor, 12; Angela Mares, 11; Sarah Graves, 11; Allyce Ozarski, 10; Nicole Kenley, 9; Breanna Suzuki, 9, and Audrey Cohen. One or more of this bunch might push into the varsity group. McGurk, for example, was the number four last year before getting hurt; and Nespor has been a varsity member as well. The frosh could come on late in the year.

The outlook: The numbers, the pack, the quality of the talent all are well within the normal range of the Poway tradition. It's a team that, in the early season, ranks just below the very best, much like Mt. Carmel. It wouldn't take much for the entire team to step up – just a breakthrough or two from the runners at the top of the roster – and then Poway would be among the top teams.

Rancho Bernardo

Division: One. Coach: Don Jones, assisted by Terry Dockery. Course: Rancho Bernardo Community Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. The gun: Sean Ricketts, 11. He's been the best at RB almost since he arrived as a freshman, when the team was good enough to tie for second in CIF Division I. "He is by far our best kid, ever," Jones, who has coached some good ones, declared. He is the fourth fastest returning runner from last year's CIF final race. In the state race, he was the second fastest soph in Division I, running 15:57. In track, he was the masters 800 champ, in 1:53.55, believed to be the fastest soph time in the event run by a section athlete. It's safe to say that he'll be one of the best ever from this area by the time he graduates. The pack: Three remain from last year's varsity: Mike Lavorgna, 12; Andy Campbell, 11; and Mike Shannon, 11. Jones is overhauling his pack, so expect some changes. The candidates: Ryan Crim, 11; Brett Stone, 12; Mark Mongeon, 12; Jake Fulton, 11; Chris Rogers, 10. Most of the group are first year runners.

The outlook: Ricketts will be in Fresno again, but the team needs time to develop.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 25. The leaders: Julie Manson, 11; and Kaleena Yee, 10. They are the fifth and third fastest returners, respectively, from last year's CIF race. In track, Manson ran 5:08 and 11:13; Yee ran 5:13 and 11:16.

It's the best one-two punch of any county team. A third?: Sarah Wilkins, 12, was the team's ace for two years, but dropped out of running last year. Now, she's back. If she returns to her former form, nobody will have a stronger top three. The pack: Katie Boyd, 10; Kerri Wheeler, 10; Lisa Lyons, 11. They were the 4-5-6 runners on the team that finished sixth in the state. Depth: Belinda Oberum, 9; Allison Hall, 9; Mikaelyn Austin, 11; Katy Coin, 11. Oberum is a former swimmer who Jones thinks has a shot to contribute. Hall has been a revelation in early meets, winning the Mt. Carmel frosh race, and taking her place among the team's top three.

The outlook: The team will be improved from last year. Jones thinks his team is upgraded at virtually every lineup spot, which means that they are among the top two or three teams in the county, and among the best in the

Rancho Buena Vista

Division: One. Coach: Tom Lux, asisted by Josh Fuller and Mark Jordan. Course: Buena Vista Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 13 to 18. The leader: Nick Thornton, 11, one of a number of junior standouts across the county. As a soph, he ran 1:58 and 4:33, and should be ready to take the next step. "He put in a very good summer," Lux said. The pack: James Myers, 12; Aaron Trunnell, 10; Brian Hill, 12. Hill ran 10:20 in the spring; the others were good XC runners last year. The depth: Jose deLeon, 9; Jason Gatewood, 12; Jamie Zolnierek, 12; Mark Johanson, 12; Shaun Ferris, 9. Lux thinks frosh deleon could make an impact on his top five. High jump ace Gatewood was running in the top four at one point last year; Johanson is a 2:03 runner.

The outlook: Thornton should continue to develop into a top runner, and Lux thinks his 2-3 positions are developing into "above-average" performers. There also seems to be enough able candidates to fill out the pack. RBV could be more than respectable, but the Palomar League is always very tough.

GIRLS:

12 to 17. Last Numbers: year's ace: Angela Garcia, 10, was last year's number one as a frosh, and she's backed that up with a "great summer" of training. The new hope: Natassja Hall, 9, "could be our number one," Lux claimed. She has great speed, with track marks of 59 and 2:21 as an eighth-grader. She also clocked a 5:14 mile in a road race. In a pre-season time-trial, she was ahead of a number of the RBV boys. The depth: Karinna Kloos, 12; Maribel Gonzalez, 12; Laurie Hauf, 12; Jessica Murray, 10; Courtney Allen, 9. Lux thinks Gonzalez could be ready to challenge for the number two slot; Kloos put in "her best summer ever;" Murray is a 5:35 runner who may split time with soccer; Allen is another talented frosh.

The outlook: Hill will be worth watching, and there's enough quality in the rest of the group for RBV to be better than most county teams. The problem: the Palomar has a number of great, near-great and very good teams.

San Marcos

Division: One. Coach: Kyle Billings. Volunteer assistants are John Counselman and Abbie Thompson. Course: Palomar College.

BOYS:

Numbers: 20. The leaders: Travis Laird, 11; Laurence Mier, 12; Andrew Boring, 12. All are veterans, although Boring didn't run last year. They put in the work during the summer and were rewarded with success at the Laguna Hills Invite. Laird ran 16:15; Mier ran 16:19 and Boring was clocked in 16:28 (all for 3.0 miles). The pack: Kirk Massengill, 12; Isaac Chitica, 10; Chris Harris, 10; Ryan Skrel, 9. Massengill is also a returning varsity runner. Soph Chitica ran 17:35 at Laguna Hills; and Skrel ran 18:05 to win the Division II frosh race.

The outlook: Much improved. It took a year, but Billings seems to have things turned in the right direction. The team did a lot of running in the summer, and they were rewarded with success in their first meet. It's a well balanced group, with three good runners at the top of the roster, and decent talent behind them. After Vista and Poway, the league race seems wide open.

GIRLS:

15. The leader: Numbers: Nicole Mier, 9. She joins an older 16:27 Colin Steele, Carl-1 brother on the team, and it didn't take her long to make her own mark. At the Laguna Hills Invite, she won the Division II frosh race in a quick 19:40 (for 3.0 miles). For some perspective, that was faster than all but one of the Fallbrook girls (who were at the same meet, but in a different race). The pack: Kelly Kodadek, 12; Nicole Whadford, 11; Jennifer Peterson, 11. They all return from last year's team. Kodadek is expected to be the team's number two girl, and is the team captain. 


BOYS:

The pack: Jose Escobedo, 11; Justin Mattos, 11; Pete Coughlin, 11; Roy Quinn, 12. Quinn was running well early last season before a stress fracture sidelined him; the others were key members of Fallbrook's varsity last year. Outlook: "I'm real excited about the girls prospects," Hauck said. "I've been excited since the last day of last season." Course: Jesmond Dene Park. although the team has no home meets this year.

BOYS:

Numbers: 15-20. The leader: Enrique Montoya, 12. He was last year's top runner. The pack: Joe Voshell, 10; Nick Cueva, 10; Juan Rangel, 11; James Barlow, 10. All are varsity vets; it was a very young team last year. Barlow is just now starting to train after recovering from a stress fracture. Challenging: Juan Mondragon, 9; Appolard Reyes, 11; Stephen Servis, 9; John Cordes, 9. Mondragon, "could be one of the best freshmen in the county," Morrow said. At Woodbridge, he won the frosh race in 16:15, just 0:05 seconds slower than Montoya ran in the senior race. 
GIRLS:

Wilson is particularly high on his junior group. Lots of depth: Claire Poissonnier, 10; Veronica Turgeon, 10; Nicole Mendoza, 10; Nancy Pahua, 10; Kim Kutzler, 10; Amber Chapel, 10; Tara Lucille, 9; Simon Guiterez, 9, and Rosio Sanchez, 9.

The outlook: It's hard to know how to assess such a large roster of able athletes. The large numbers have to work in Ramona's favor, however. The quality of the program is already established, so two important parts of the equation are in place.

BOYS:

The Numbers: 30. leader: Adam Van Wart, 12. He's been one of the team's best since he was a soph; his 4:24 in the spring shows his speed and talent. The top of the pack: Kyle Combe, 12; Erik Kerby, 11. Both have been in place on the varsity for at least a year. Combe has gone through a growth spurt that could translate into added speed; Kerby might be the most improved after his 16:56 for the Balboa 3-mile in August. The pack: Matt Dowthit, 12; Joe Dupee, 11. Both are varsity vets. Two other candidates are Jason Zamora, 12; and Matt Johnson, 10. Johnson ran 2:02 as a frosh.



BOYS:





ber two, he is the fifth fastest returning league runner from last year's CIF race. He is very fit after a productive off-season. The pack: Mike Hunter, 11; Mike Scully, 11; Josh Laubacher, 10; Hunter Hazen, 12; James Corpstein, 12. Best off-season training was turned in by Hunter and Scully, who trained with Gomes. Corpstein also trained well. Depth: Sheehan thinks a freshman or two will rise from the ranks to challenge the pack.

The outlook: The Sultans lost their one and three from last year's squad. It's a young, developing team, with three juniors at the top. It's too soon to judge where they'll finish, but they should be able to compete with most rivals.

GIRLS:

15. The leader: Numbers: Kim Pace, 12. She's a two-time CIF champ (in Divison III) in cross country, and has track PRs of 2:23, 5:11 and 11:56. She struggled in track, but is now very fit and very determined. The 14th-fastest returning girl from last year's CIF, she is primed for a strong senior season. The pack: The immediate support group needs some rebuilding. The 2-3-4 girls have graduated or left the sport, and Sheehan needs her pack girls to step up. Becki Chaney, 11; Mary Broding, 12; and Paige Sessions, 11, all had varsity experience last year for a strong Santana squad. The depth: Elisa Benitez, 9; Elizabeth Jones, 12; Thea Bachman, 11. Benitez is probably the best of the frosh, she follows two older sisters into the program. Jones was on the edge of the varsity last year; Bachman is a good allaround athlete giving running a try.

The outlook: The team was a powerhouse in Division III the last two years, taking two CIF team titles. Now, they're in Division II, and some key runners are gone. In addition, league rival West Hills is steadily building in quality (the teams were virtually even last year). But Pace is still one of the league's (and county's) best, and there is some experience on the roster. Still one of the better league teams, but more of a longshot in CIF, now that they're in Division II.

West Hills

Division: One. Coaches: Pat Connolly, boys; Bill Cleves, girls. Assisted by John Liberatore and Alyssa (Nicodemus) Rogers. Course: On campus.

BOYS:

Numbers: 35-40. The gun: Evan Fox, 11. He's a special talent, combining great physical ability and great competitiveness. He has the potential to be one of the best runners the county has produced. He is better in track, where he ran 4:16/1:56 as a frosh; and 1:54/4:22 as a soph despite missing about half the season to an in-jury. "He's healthy," Connolly said, "and this is as good a summer as he's had." The next guy: Ben Aragon, 10, is a solid number two runner despite his youth. He was one of the team's top runners as a frosh, and added a 1:58 in track. The pack: Paul Saccone, 12; Matt Rendina, 12; Dan Sutton-Kane, 11. Saccone is a 4:29/9:54 talent. He and Rendina are making the most of their senior year. "They're motivated," Connolly said. "They want to lead by example. We can be very good if those guys have a good season." Sutton-Kane came on last season and is expect-ed to continue his improvement. The next pack: John

Aguilar, 11; Tim Rodman, 12; Mike Ficken, 12. Rodman, a 10:08 runner, could crack the top group. Aguilar, who ran 4:45 as a soph, might have the talent to move up as well. Also: Bryan Bauerle, 11; Brian Covell, 12; Lance Elliott, 10. Elliott was a good frosh XC runner who didn't run track. "One of our strengths will be our depth," Connolly understated.

The outlook: West Hills is one of the first two or three teams mentioned by any rival coach as a candidate for the county's best. They ended up last season as the topranked outfit locally, and they have most of that team back. The program is an assembly-line: they lose one or two good runners every year, and replace them, often with better ones.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 42. The leader: Heather Shurtleff, 12. She is top quality (fourth fastest of the returning runners from last year's CIF), but has often been injured in her career. Her track bests date back to her soph year (5:15 and 11:38), as last season was wiped out. She is doing more cross-training this year and, so far, has been healthy. "That (her health) will be a key for us," Cleves said. The pack: Most return, including Rebecca Bartell, 11; Ashley Handy, 10; Shawna Winfrey, 10, and Ann Rendina, 10. Bartell ran 5:30 in track; Winfrey ran 800 in 2:22. It's a talented group. Depth: Leah Marrin, 10; Cassie Kuske, 10; Cheryl Madsen, 11; and some frosh runners all have a chance to push into that varsity group.

The outlook: Cleves is playing his cards pretty close to the vest. "Overall, I'm opti-mistic," he allowed. The biggest challenge will be the move up to Division I, which puts the Wolfpack into some tough competition. They are a solid top ten squad, at the least, as long as they're healthy:



Division: One. Coach: Ian Cumming, assisted by Dave Hunter, Julie Phair and Bryan Wallbank. Course: Rohr Park, in Bonita.

BOYS:

Numbers: 40. The leader: Brian Paff, 12. He's been an ace since he arrived. He's the third fastest returning runner in the section, but H\he had a disappointing track season, running the 1600 in 4:27 (he ran 4:22 as a soph). Number two: Ted Herbert rose through the ranks to be the second man in the final meet as a frosh; and followed that with a 9:56 3200 in track. He's the heir apparent when Paff graduates. The pack: Graduation took away the 3 through 7 runners, but Bonita is never short of material. Expected to move up in class are Dustin Whitson, 10; Brad Fowers, 12; and Dale Houser, 11. Houser, "found out how good he was in track," when he clocked 2:00 for 800. Depth: There is a large group of runners challenging for the remaining varsity slots. Cumming was reluctant to name names because the competition is far from decided, but he likes the looks of Austin Neudecker, 10; Ryan Butler, 11; Clayton Phair, 12; and Randy Phair, 10. number of other athletes could emerge, as well.

The outlook: There's no reason to think that this will not be an excellent team. The top two are very talented and very proven; and depth of the pack is always a Bonita trademark. They are the league cofavorites, with Sweetwater.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 30. The leaders: Candice Osuna, 12; and Dawna Marshall, 12. Osuna was last year's team leader, and the Metro's second

fastest girl, after Davila, and she ran 11:53 in track. Marshall, "had her best summer ever," and also has been under 12:00 for the 3200. Right behind: Bree Ann Alfstad, 10; and Trinity Amalfitano, 10. Both were well up on the varsity roster last year, and they also have track credentials (Alfstad, 12:13; Amalfitano, 2:28). Cumming thinks they have the potential to push the top two. Involved: Van Nauyen, 12. The logical spot for her is number five, but cross country is a minor footnote on a resume that includes Girls State, Girls Nation, speech and debate, and serving as the lone student representative to the Sweetwater High School governing board. Depth: Katie Bowman, 11; Kristen Thompson, 10; Kelly Milliken, 10; Marissa Munoz, 10; Heather Romero, 10; Karen Albrecht, 12; Dolores Rodriguez, 9; and Kate Branson, 9. All have talent. Thompson and Milliken were impressive in JV track last year; Albrecht is a potential top five candidate if healthy; the freshmen bear watching.

The outlook: They could be the class of the Metro, along with Chula Vista, and they could develop into a Top Ten team on the local level.

Castle Park

Division: Two. Coach: Brad Grady. Course: Hilltop High.

BOYS:

Numbers: 16. The leader: Dan Flores, 11. He was among the team's best last year as a soph, and continued his development in track, where he ran 800 in 2:00, and 1600 in 4:34. The pack: Frankie Cueva, 12; Manuel Silva, 12; Adrian Ortiz, 11. They all return from last year's varsity group. In early workouts, Cueva seemed to be the number two, ahead of Silva and Ortiz. New: Emilio Ramos, 9; Ray Torres, 9; Arturo Payan, 9. Grady likes his frosh group. He pegs Torres as a potential 800-meter runner, and thinks he'll challenge the front pack.

The outlook: Flores could be a potential standout; at least he seems to have the basic tools. There is some experience behind him, although the team is a bit thin. There is some youth in the middle of the pack, however, which could mean that this is a team with better days ahead.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 10. The leaders: Maria Melvin, 12; Ana Melvin, 9 (they are sisters); Alma Bautista, 9. Grady thought this trio was fairly even in talent. Also: Lily Lopez, 10. She returns from last year's team.

The outlook: Grady thinks the Melvins and Bautista are a strong and talented top three, but he concedes that the lack of numbers will work against him this season. Still, the team should be respectable, and maybe even competitive in the league.

Numbers: 20. The leader: Michael Manzano, 11. His team nickname is "animal," reflecting the effort he puts into his workouts and races. He has talent to go along with his work ethic; he ran 9:57 for 3200 in the spring. The pack: Aaron Galvan, 12; Gabriel Cornejo, 12; Brian Eaton, 11; Efrain Novelo, 10; Josh Galindo, 11; Cesar Medina, 11; Geronimo Arredondo, 12; Bobby Pfeiffer, 9; Dennis Higgins, 9; and Ken Nwadike, 12. Galvan and Eaton return from last year's varsity; Novelo is a transfer from RBV. Nwadike is an important runner; at his best, he's a strong number two.

The outlook: Chula Vista always worries foes. The league's coaches respect the strength of the program, and habitually list them as a viable contender even in the absence of hard information. Of course, Chula should never be counted out. Manzano is very solid at the top of the order; and there is potential behind him. The Metro boys teams seem to be "up" this year.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 29. The leader: Mythili Duvvuri, 10. She's earned the nickname of "Miley," partly because it's an easier pronunciation than her actual first name, and partly because she just runs so many miles. She is one of the top returning league runners, and seems to be much improved after a good summer of training. She was impressive at the Norseman meet, running the fourth fastest time of the day. The pack: Bertha Ojeda, 11; Lilana Sandoval, 11; Sophie Marquez, 9; Nadia Sanders, 10; Camille Robinson, 10; Christina Cisneros, 11; Carmela Hodgers, 12; Liliana Acevedo, 9; Angel Robinson, 10. There's a lot of talent in this group. Ojeda was last year's number two, but is coming off an injury. Sanders is an outstanding track sprinter (her dad is the assistant coach), but is adjusting fast to long distance. Marquez could push into the number two slot.

The outlook: Very good. In the non-scoring Norseman Invite, the Spartan girls were just behind University City and Valhalla in team times, and ahead of such outfits as Poway, Vista, and Scripps Ranch. Chula can contend with Bonita Vista for league honors; and they could be one of the best in the county.

Eastlake

Division: Two. Coaches: Troy Vierra, head coach. Jeff Mechling, boys; Karen Kreul, girls. Course: Hilltop High.

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. The pack: Marko Ramirez, 11; Kyle McMahan, 12; Andrew Howard, 12; Ralph Bonilla, 12. All return from last year's varsity. New: Cole Davis, 10; Vernon Ng, 9; John Silva, 9; Ryan Dodds, 9; Barry Bright, 9. Mechling has a nice group of new runners. "We have a lot of freshmen," he said. "And they're good-looking freshmen. By the time they're seniors, they'll be very good."

The outlook: Theres's a coaching transition, and a large group of new runners, which adds up to a bit of a rebuild. But Mechling has decent numbers, and a large proportion of them are very young, and that adds up to a potentially successful rebuild.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 8. The best: Pati Romero, 9. She was the team's fastest in early races. At Mt. Carmel, she was 17th in the small schools girls frosh race, running 19:35. Also: Jodie Linder, 11; Katie Sondenberger, 10; Cerrisa Cavin, 10; Lezly Paez, 10. Cavin and Linder return from last year's varsity.

The outlook: Like the boys, the girls are in transition, but Kreul is upbeat about the challenge. "The girls I have out are good," she said. A big plus is the team's youth, which gives Kreul a foundation to build on.

Hilltop

Division: Two. Coach: Chip Holmes, assisted by Paul Brents and Cesar Melvin. Course: On campus.

BOYS: Numbers: 18-25. The leader: Jimmy Schroeder, 11. He has

been one of the team's best since he was a frosh, and he is the sixth fastest returning Metro runner. And he's just getting to the prime of his career. The pack: Alex Guzman, 10; Sam Stewart, 12; Javier Paz, 12. All are veterans of last year's varsiity. Challenging: Lorenzo Otero, 10; Jose Beltran, 11; Nathan Aginiga, 10; Taylor Burnett, 12. Holmes thinks Otero might run his way into the number two slot. Burnett and Stewart are two of the most improved runners.

The outlook: This is a developing team, with a junior and two sophs expected to be among the best runners. If that development can continue at the normal rate of improvement, the Lancers could be a force in the Metro next year. Even this year, the team should be competitive. Holmes thinks his pack is starting to jell. "One through five are relatively close," he said. "We could be pretty decent."

GIRLS:

Numbers: 17. The big gun: Desiree Davila, 10. What a splash she made as a frosh last year: CIF champ in Division II; fastest girl in entire CIF field (by 25 seconds); second place in the state meet; fastest local at the regionals; and, in the spring, the county's fastest 1600 runner at 4:59. Any improvement over her freshman year puts her into local legend territory. The pack: Erin DeHahn, 12; Lara Wells, 11; Elizabeth Kolata, 11; Teresa Escobedo, 11. All were varsity members last year. DeHahn is better known for her track exploits (a 2:15 800 as a soph). Depth: Vanessa Vitela, 12. Vitela was injured last year, but could move up in the pack.

The outlook: Sometimes, great talent at the top can energize an entire team. Davila is as good a number one as anyone could want, and there's some talented athletes in the ranks. If the pack begins to develop, this could

be a dangerous team.

Mar Vista

Division: Two. Coaches: Boys, Ben Holt. Girls, Suzanna Vega. Course: Lucky Waller Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 20. The pack: Holt returns his numbers two through six runners from last year's team. They are (in the order of last year's CIF results): Frankie Ortega, 11; James Sheppard, 11; Kenny Lewis, 10; Pedro Rivas, 10; and Adan Sanchez, 11. The first four finished 45 seconds apart - a sign of things to come? Depth: Charley Russell, 10; John Borja, 11; Blake Swier, 11. Russell also was on last year's team. Swier is trying cross country for the first time; his dad was a 1:56/4:23 runner for Mount Miguel in the 1970s, and Holt thinks he might be able to run near the front of the pack.

The outlook: It is an amazingly young group, with no seniors, an experienced lead pack of about halfand-half juniors and sophs; and a "good freshman" group behind them. Holt expects juniors Ortega and Swier to lead the team, and he is also expecting a tight group. "We might be a surprise," he said. "Our guys are pretty close together." The team obviously has talent and potential. The main question is, how fast does it develop?

GIRLS:

Numbers: 8-12. The leader: Chrissy Tomlinson, 11. She's a yeararound athlete, with experience in soccer, water polo, and softball. The pack: Lindsey Smith, 10; Maranda Quick, 10; Priscilla Gomez, 10; Michelle Smith, 10; Holly Pinnick, 11. Pinnick might be the team's number two; she ran as a freshman, moved away, and has returned. Lindsey Smith and Quick return from last year's team; Michelle Smith and Gomez are newcomers with talent.

The outlook: Vega is coaching the Mariner girls for the second year. She is a social science teacher at the school, and her "on campus" presence could help the team's eventual development. Her numbers are up from previous years, and she has a number of athletic girls on the roster.

Montgomery

Division: One. Coach: Ruben Ledesma, assisted by Juan Gonzalez. Course: Lucky Waller Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 15. The leaders: Jose Simpson, 11, and Jesus Carrillo, 11. Ledesma thinks both have a chance to rise into the league's top ten this year. The pack: Michael Campos, 12, is the only other varsity returner. Raul Garcia, 10, ran 4:52 and 10:50 as a frosh, and could push the top two. Depth: Cliff Barnes, 10; Jimmy Olivares, 10. They're the top candidates to round out the varsity. Ledesma also has yet to assess a group of 5 or 6 from the soccer team.

The outlook: It's a young, developing team that is probably a year away. But they could still be good enough to place in the top half of the

GIRLS:

Numbers: 25. The leader: Angela Rivas, 11. She was the fourth fastest Metro girl at CIF last year, and ran 5:26 for 1600. She's a very solid number one. The pack: Ledesma only returns one other varsity runner from the team that surprised many with a second place league finish. She is Eva Burgueno, 12, who, "has improved a lot." Building depth: Ledesma has good numbers out, and has some likely candidates to fill up the varsity: Lyra Ponce, 10; Maria Urias, 12; Laura Snyder, 10; Regina Valdez, 10; Edna Moreno, 9; Andra Rivas, 9; and Jessica Lopez, 10. He expects Ponce and Urias to push into the top four, and is looking for a fifth.

The outlook: Of last year's second-place team, Ledesma admitted, "If you asked me at this time last year, I wouldn't know we were going to be that good." Ledesma will need to develop some talent to match last year's record, but it's not out of the

question.

Southwest

Division: One. Coach: Jesus Rodriguez. Course: Lucky Waller Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 15. Returns: Alex Ramirez, 11; Jorge Mora, 10; Arturo Vallesteros, 12. Ramirez was the team's fastest at CIF last year. Also: Fernando Rojas, 11. Rodriguez has a group of soccer players trying the sport; Rojas is one of those who already shows some talent.

The outlook: Cross country is a struggling sport at a school like Southwest, where football and futbol are far more popular. Rodriguez might have some luck by getting some of the soccer players to try the sport.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 5. The best: Amy Iniguez, 9; and Ivy Iniguez, 10. The sisters are new to the area, but show promise.

The outlook: The team is so thin in numbers that they may not field a scoring group.

<u>Sweetwater</u>

Division: Qne. Coach: Tim Latham, assisted by Joe Lara, girls, and Craig Balsley. Course: Rohr Park, in Bonita.

BOYS:

25-30. The The numbers: leaders: Adrian Garcia, 12; Ruben Vences, 11. The Devils had a very strong top three last year, and two

Hoover

Division: Two. Coach: Frank Browne. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS: 7. The best: Thomas Okumu, 12; Abdulle Mukhtar, 9; Nicolas Ocadiz, 9. Browne is starting from scratch, but he already likes the look of Okumu, whom he expects to lead the team in racing. Mukhtar, although young is already, "pretty good. He's the hardest worker of the group." Ocadiz, another youngster, "could be decent. He could develop," Browne said.

The outlook: It's Browne's first year at Hoover, and the boys team has virtually no returning runners. But it is also a school that is recognized as a source of good talent. However, the talent must be identified, recruited and allowed to develop. That process requires two to three years, which Browne recognizes. "This year, we

just want to improve and have fun," he said. "Next year will be a lot better. The improvement could be drastic." Expect some respectability this season, and better things down the road.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 9. The leader: Merlyn Diaz, 11. She has been a promising talent at the school since her freshman year, and should be the team's best. Because of work conflicts, she got a late start on the fall training, but she should be solid by the end of the year. The core: Maria Magno, 12; Elizabeth Cortez, 11; Jessica Hogue, 10. Browne characterizes these three as the "hard workers," and thinks they'll form the nucleus of the team.


The outlook: The girls team is a bit ahead of the boys at this stage, starting with Diaz, a good returning runner. The raw numbers aren't where Browne wants them yet, but the team has taken to the task at hand, and will improve. As for Browne, he deserves some of the credit for the emergence of the strong teams at University City, where he developed much of the talent, and built the foundation. He faces a similar challenge at Hoover.

Coaches: Division: Three. Chuck Boyer, boys, assisted by Joe Leek. Tom Dorman, girls. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS:

Numbers: 38. The leader: Brandon Behr, 11. He ran 4:31 last spring, excellent time for a soph; and he'll move right to the top of the La Right behind: Jolla pack. Alejandro Mares, 12. He's a 2:00 runner who has been splitting time with the soccer team. He's concentrating

on running now, and Boyer expects him to elevate to the number two slot. The pack: Nate Lopez, 11; Eric Koster, 11; Matt Granger, 12; Jonathan Dunbar, 11. All have experience; Dunbar has been doing "awesome mileage," according to Boyer: 100 miles per week in the summer. Challenging: Larry Koster, 11; Tim Petrie, 12; Chris Ferrier, 10; Chad Valderrama, 10; Scott Davis, 10. Koster is the twin of Eric Koster, but has not been running as long. Petrie was injured last year, but is healthy now; Ferrier was one of last year's best JVs.

The outlook: Could be the sleeper in the county. Boyer likes his team's fitness. "We're better prepared at this time than past teams have been," he said. They lost their ace (David Dunbar), but this is not a program built on star power. The Vikings love to use that old pack magic to frustrate foes.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 60. The leaders: Desiree Leek, 10; Morgan Romine, 12; and Julia Otis, 12. Leek was the team's best runner at CIF, and ran 11:30 in track. Romine had mono last fall, but was one of the Vikes' best as a soph. The pack: Emily Seymour; Leslie Borenstein, 10; Michelle Guererro; Katie Grim; Liz Edwards, 9; Maggie Sass, 10. Borenstein was the team's number two at last year's CIF meet. Sass didn't run XC last fall, but did run track. Edwards is progressing quickly; she might be the team's number two.



Actually, it may be unfair to differentiate these five returning varsity runners into lead-

ers and pack, as Velarde thinks that they are, to a degree, interchangeable. Depth: Jameson Hester, 9; Josh Jones, 9.

The outlook: "It is a very young team," Velarde said. Indeed, of the seven expected to lead the way, there is only one senior. Soph Graves seems to be improving fast and should be a force before he graduates. "We have a really tight pack," Velarde said. "That's what we're going to work on." It will be a learning experience most of the year for Mission Bay's young runners, but they will win a few league meets. By year's end, if the young talent develops, they could be a darkhorse in CIF Division III.

Numbers: 12. Swimming: Last year's star, Amanda Powers, is a senior this year, but has left the sport to concentrate on swimming. The leader: Rose Serna, 9. Her debut was at the Norseman meet, where she was sixth in the Division II frosh/soph race. She is the team's top runner, "by far," according to Velarde. The number two: Ann Ghashghaee, 11, was the next fastest Buc at Lindo Lakes. She ran varsity last year. The pack: Angie Hanchett, 10; Alyson Walker, 10; Jennifer Cwikla, 9; Hannah Stein, 9; Janelle Mattson, 10; Kara Elizondo, 11. Hanchett is in her first year of cross country, but Velarde expects her to rise high in the pack; Walker is a returning varsity vet; Elizondo's older brother was Devin Elizondo, one of Mission Bay's former greats.

The outlook: The girls team is even younger than the boys squad, with one junior in the top five runners. But in cross country that is not necessarily that bad. For instance, frosh Serna already is running apace with some good runners. "It's all so new to her, but she'll do well," Velarde said. "If we can keep this group together, we'll be fine."

Our Lady of Peace

Division: Three. Coach: Dan Keays, assisted by Lisa Moslow. Course: Morley Field.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 13-20. The leader: Claire Beck, 11. She is among the ten fastest returning girls from league at last year's CIF race, and followed that up with an 11:42 in track. The pack: Keays returns five others from his varsity group, including Jessica Gombes, 12; Patricia Venereo, 10; Maura Bannon, 11; Laura Meathe, 12; and Kristen Clayton, 12. Gombes, who finished as last year's number two, has only just begun to

workout after off-season jaw surgery. Also returning is Natalie Watkins, 12, who was a member of last year's varsity until sidelined by asthma.

The outlook: The Western almost always is a tough go for schools the size of OLP, but Beck is looking good, and Keays is hoping the rest of the team will take up the challenge.

St. Augustine

Division: Four. Coach: Jerry Downey. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS:

Numbers: 35. The leaders: Matt Herriman, 11; Colin Donnelly, 12; Alfonso Espinosa, 12. Herriman has stepped up; the seniors are very solid. The pack: Kevin Correnti, 12; Jon Gardner, 11. Both were varsity runners last year. May help: Sean O'Rourke, 10; Pat Burnett, 10. O'Rourke didn't run XC last year.

The outlook: It's a bit of a rebuilding year for the Saints after losing the talented one-two punch of Sullivan and Greene. "It's a strange world for us this year," Downey said. "We have to reassemble." But league foes shouldn't take them too lightly. There is tradition, good coaching, and the return of runners 3 through 7 from last year's varsity. They'll be respectable in the regular season and the team to watch in Division IV at the CIF meet.

Scripps Ranch

Division: Two. Coach: Bob Oliver. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS: Numbers: 41. The leaders: Pat Grimes, 12; Brendan Riordan, 11. Grimes has been a valuable runner for Scripps all along; he's a 4:25 and 9:40 track runner, and he begins the season in great shape. Riordan is more of an unknown after not being able to run varsity last year (CIF ruled him ineligible after a transfer), but Oliver and other coaches know he has talent. "He's going to help us," Oliver said. In early meet Raphael Machado, 11, also showed signs of moving to the front. The pack: It's dense and talented. Oliver counts at least 11 strong candidates to fill out the varsity after the top three. Andy Delery, 12; Chris Sandoval, 12; Brian Culleton, 12; Jonathan Hester, 11; Mike Comstock, 11; Brent DeLong, 10; and Caleb Garlip, 9, have all shown well in early workouts, and there's more behind them. Delery, Sandoval and Hester all ran varsity last year. "We have a lot of depth," Oliver said.

The outlook: "It's very early," Oliver reflected, "but I have a good feeling about this group. I think they can be very, very good. We'll still be a strong pack team." If Riordan is as good as advertised, the Falcons are strong at the top. The depth is there, for sure. And Oliver is a top coach. Mark them as league favorites, and as a team to be watched in Division II at CIF. A definite Top Ten team.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 16. The leader: Shanna Cohen, 11. She was an unknown transfer last year who rose to the top of the pack behind Kelly Grimes and Angeline Spain, and was a key ingredient of the Falcons' success. She may not reach the level of a runner like, say, Grimes, but she'll be solid. The pack: Lisa Nguyen, 12; Grace Anderson, 10. Both were scoring members of a team good enough to take second in the state. Any questions? Also: Tracy Tom, 10; Lyndsy Hassett, 12; Christian d'Acquisto, 12; Judy Tincher, 9; Laurie LaBrado, 9. Hassett was last year's number seven. Oliver says the varsity candidates are all "closely knit."

The outlook: It's a slightly different look for Scripps. In the past,

BOYS:

"He's run about twice as many miles as he ever has before (in the off-season)." O'Connor ran 2:01 and 4:29 in track, so the talent is there. The top of the pack: Edgar Hernandez, 11; and Charles McKeown, 11. Hernandez was the team's top finisher at CIF, and McKeown has put in the hard work over the off-season. The depth: McCarthy has lost his other four varsity runners, and must rebuild the back of the pack. Among the candidates are Joel Nierman, 11; Dylan Solomon, 10; Katsuki Shimasaki, 10; Jeff Guido, 9; and Max Kerber, 9. McCarthy thinks Nierman will be a suitable fourth, but is hoping a fifth will emerge.

The outlook: The Centurions have a good combination of ingredients: a motivated leader, some other decent talent, a hard-working team, and a good coach.

GIRLS: Numbers: 30. The leader: Katherine Ziegler is the most obviously talented. She's the fastest returning girl from last year's CIF race in the league, and she ran some great track times, such as 5:05 and 2:17. Right behind: Talisha Clophus, 10. She was last year's number two as a frosh, and clocked a 2:17 in the 800 in the spring. Also, "she had a great summer," McCarthy said. talented pack: Carly Votolato, 12; Reb-ecca McKeown, 11; and Leslie Crews, 12 are all talented. Votolato, a 2:26, 5:26 track runner, "could challenge" for the top spot; Crews, with a 12:13 3200 mark, is "very strong," and McKeown, a 12:14 runner, is "just a horse." The depth: Lauren Severs, 10; Laura Cohen, 10; and Johanna Mubaraki, 12. Severs was hurt in early season; Cohen ran 12:24 as a frosh. Talented youth: Chessa Adsit-Morris, 10; is a figureskater who is trying running for the first time but she's made a big impression. "She's come out of nowhere," McCarthy said. "She's strong. Also keep an eye on Karissa Teitsch, 9, the best of the frosh in early season.

The outlook: McCarthy thinks his girls are, "very interested, very experienced, very strong and very fast." That would seem to cover just about everything. "I've never had a group like this," he said. The team might be about in the middle of an early season Top Ten, but they could

also rise higher.

University of SD

Division: Three Coach: Dan Geiger, assisted by Kevin Yaley and Kate Gordon. Course: Morley Field. BOYS:

Numbers: 30-35. The leader: Erik Hanley, 12. He was the team's fastest at last year's CIF meet, and is the 11th fastest returner from the league. The pack: Brian Thielen, 10; Steve Dalton, 10; Eric Pisor, 11. All return from last year's top seven. Geiger thinks Thielen and Dalton are his 2-3 runners in the early season. Challengers: Patrick Marsch, 9; Evan Lentz, 9; Mark Pfizenmayer, 11. Marsch and Lentz are two goodlooking frosh runners; Pfizenmayer could be up in the top three if healthy.

The outlook: "We're trying to build the program back up," after numbers had declined, Geiger said. He spent a busy summer on the phone, getting bodies to commit. Most of his group are sophs and frosh, so he's already put together a good base. "The boys might have a good future," Geiger said. The payoffs will come down the road.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 25-30. The leader: Michelle Barrack, 12. She burst upon the local scene like a meteor as a soph, running 5:11 and 11:02 in her first try at track. Last year was spent mostly on the injured list, but she returned to the track late in the year and ran 5:24 and 11:18 off less than a month of training. Now, she's healthy, and "looking good." It will be fun to see what she can do in this sport if she enjoys an injury-free season. On the shelf: Jackie Ott, 12. She might be nearly as good as Barrack, but she is only just getting back to training after a series of injuries: stress tracture, knee, shins. She now does a lot of cross training and has been fitted with orthotics. Geiger may not enter her in races until well into the season. The pack: There is only one other returnee from last year's top seven: Julie Babonas, 12, who is "pretty solid, a good athlete." Depth: Geiger will hope that a few of his large soph group can step up. Best so far are Nicole Marsch, 10; Jenny Mac-Auley, 10; and Kalen Albe, 10.

The outlook: Barrack has a lot of talent. If Jackie Ott can get back anywhere near to form, the Dons will be very good in the 1-2 slots. And the school traditionally has been able to fill the roster with good athletes who progress quickly. If so, Uni can be a very good Division III team, and

competitive in the league.

He was the fourth fastest Eastern runner at CIF last fall, and turned in a 4:30 1600 in the spring. "He's very talented," Lery said. "I see the possibility of great things coming from him." The pack: Mark Marshall, 12; Michael Hilton, 12; Getachew Tsegaw, 10; Keith Goodman, 10. All return from the varsity. Tsegaw is improving fast; Goodman is a nationally ranked (by age) kayaker. Depth: Nick Vubel, 11; David Marshall, 10; Sam Saylor, 11; Andrew Stead, 12; David Esqueda, 11. Marshall is one of the most improved; Esqueda, who didn't run last year, could push into the next group.

The outlook: Could be the team to beat in the East. "If the guys can stay healthy, we can be formidable," Lery said. The Patriots are strong at the top, solid in the pack, and seem to have depth. They should be a force in the league and a team to watch at CIF.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 13. Soccer: Lisa Bengtson, 12, a great natural talent, has decided to concentrate on soccer. The leaders: Cassandra Liss, 11; Angie Fitzpatrick, 11. Both were in the Pats' top four last year. The pack: Sheila Sukramule, 9; Jessica Woods, 9; Delicia Reza; Ashley King, 11. One or both of the frosh could be at or near the top of this team.

The outlook: "We're rebuilding," Lery said. It will probably take most of the season for the parts of the puzzle to be fitted together. One plus is that the league has a number of teams in basically the same situation, which means wide-open competition.

Kearny

Division: Three. Coach: Matt Peralta. Assisted by Stephanie Strenger. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS:

Numbers: 10. The ace: Mohamed Aden, 12. Kearny uncovered a gem last year when Aden first tried running. He was pretty good in cross country (low 17:00s in CIF), but really came into his own during the track season, where he blazed to a 1:53.61 for 800 and almost took the masters title. He also added a 4:20 for the 1600; great running for a first year athlete. He ran a number of summer track meets and will spend the early cross country season regrouping just a bit. It will be interesting to see how he develops later in the season, as he continues to build on his background conditioning. Also: Charles Hunt, 11; Haji Hassan, 9; Mohammed Hussein, 10. Hunt is a returning runner; Hassan and Hussein are new runners with talent, and Peralta thinks they'll be his two-three runners.

The outlook: The team is very thin (Kearny is by far the smallest school in the league), but Aden is fast making a reputation. He ran 16:48 at the Baron Invite with little cross country preparation. What happens when

he gets in shape?

GIRLS: Numbers: 7-9. The leader: Karla de los Santos, 11. She was the team's fastest last year, and also in this year's early meets. Also: Diana Ybarra, 11; Jackie Jenkins. Both are sprinters hoping to gain strength, and they could help.

Mira Mesa

Division: Two. Coach: Dennis Lottermoser. Assisted by Mark Dvorkin and Phil Grooms. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. The leader: Thomas Jodoin, 12. He was the team's best at the end of last year, and should be in the top ten in the league. He, "had a good summer of training." The pack: The team returns most of their varsity, including David Madsen, 12; Jesse Davis, 10; Matt Patino, 12; Kyle O'Donoghue, 10; and Kevin Norton, 10. Patino looks sharply improved. Depth: Lottermoser expects to upgrade the pack with three new runners: Brandon Zelones, 9; Ivan Gonzalez, 11; and Michael Knudsen, 9. Another frosh, Kelly Jodoin, may fit in at the three or four slot. Thao Le, 10, is another young runner who showed well at the Norseman race.

The outlook: Never count out Mira Mesa. On paper, with Fox moving away, and few athletes re-

Numbers: 15-20. The leader: Amonica Phipps, 10. She's the best pure long distance runner the Tigers have had in some time. As a frosh, she was the team leader virtually the entire year until a bad race at the CIF meet. She then ran 5:30 in the spring. "She's doing well," Mac-Donald said. "Last year she began to learn how to run." She is coming off a good summer of training. The total package: Monique Henderson, 10. Everybody knows about her track exploits (a state title in the 400, etc.); but she was a big contributor in cross country as well. She typically runs age group meets most of the summer, so MacDonald gives her a few weeks to recover. "She likes cross country," MacDonald said. "I think she likes to be able to not have all the attention, and she knows it will help her. She is the total package." The pack: Jessica Villasenor, 12; Eureka Thompson, Both were solid last year; Thompson is also a talented trackster. Depth: Nicky Ramos, 10; Tracy Nelson, 11, are both going to challenge for varsity spots; and somebody else could rise from the ranks as well.

The outlook: The Morse girls won the league title last year, and have many of the key elements returning. Phipps is class and Henderson is a good number two. If MacDonald can develop just a bit of depth, they'll be a handful for any league rival.



Barnett reports that the team is bottom-heavy with trosh and sophs, and expects a few other runners to challenge for varsity spots.

The outlook: The Pointers had an off-year last season, and didn't really contend for the East title. In the off-season, "The girls came up to me and asked me what it would take," Barnett said. "They wanted to work hard." That's exactly what ensued, as the girls put in the miles, and reported in good shape. Barnett now has a team with good talent at the top, strong runners in the pack, and plenty of young depth. They are the early season favorites in the Eastern League. They could be among the better teams in CIF's Division 2 as well.

San Diego

Division: One. Coach: Ed Ramos. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS:

Numbers: 14. The leader: Alex Cocina, 12. He was late in joining the team, but he is worth waiting for: he is the fifth fastest returning runner in the league. In track, he ran 4:35 and 9:59. New: Just about everybody else on the roster. Except for Cocina, Ramos lost just about the entire roster from last year's excellent team. Now, he has to reconstruct the team with a group of mostly freshmen and sophomores. "It's a challenge," he said.

The outlook: "I don't like to talk about my team," Ramos said. "I like to be very low-key." In most years, the Cavers have some excellent material, and Ramos knows what to do with it. But this year, the Cavers seem to be genuinely in a rebuilding mode.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 5-6. The leader: Roxanne Romo, 10. "She is the bright spot," Ramos said. "She is a very hard worker; quiet and dedicated." Romo is in the top five returning league runners, and is a 12:11 3200 runner. Her father was a great distance runner for the Cavers. Look it up: Orvin Romo ran 1:54.2 for 880 yards (worth 1:53.6 for 800 meters), and he was third in the CIF meet in 1966.).

The outlook: Team is very thin, but Romo should develop into one of the league's best.

Serra

Division: Two. Coaches: Jim Richards, boys; Pat Trotter, girls. Course: Morley Field.

BOYS:

Numbers: 28. The best: Marcus Chandler, 12. He is as talented as any county runner, with 4:15/9:22 credentials. He has set some appropriately high goals this season, including success at the state and regional levels. Those goals are within his reach. "He's in the best shape he's ever been in," Richards said. The bad news: Twin Marice Chandler, 12, is not running this year; opting for a variety of other activities. As a runner, he was literally just a step behind Marcus. The new prospect: Terence Hagans, 11. A good athlete who is new to running, Hagans has impressed his coaches. "He's a killer in practice," Richards said. The pack: Dru Imrie, 12; Daniel Soltero, 11; Gerry Stevens, 11; Abelardo Suarez, 12. The Q's return the 3-4-5-6 runners from last year's varsity.

The outlook: What could have been? Serra was bringing back virtually their entire roster, including two top talents, and was ready to add another good pros-pect. But there is no way to compensate for losing a talent like Marice Chandler. On the other hand, there doesn't seem to be a dominant team in the East, and no reason Serra couldn't be competitive.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 20-25. The leader: Kjirsten Bevins, 12. This will be her third year at the top of the charts for Serra, and she's also near the top of the league. If fact, she was the second fastest Eastern League girl at last year's CIF meet (see above). The pack: Also returning from last year's varsity group are Andrea Kahn, 10; Kristen Ogdon, 11; and Maryann Berry, 12. Kahn was last year's number three; Ogdon could be right behind her. **New:** Trotter thinks a pair of frosh will help. Amy Lang, 9, is already running in the number two spot in early workouts; and Stephanie Kass, 9, is also penciled into a varsity

The outlook: The Eastern League girls race seems to be up for grabs. Bevins is already established as a strong ace; if some of the newcomers can beef up the pack, Serra will be in the hunt.

Division: Five. Coach: Wendy Svatek. Assisted by Cory Logan. Course: UCSD, although the team has no scheduled home meets.

BOYS:

Numbers: 22. The leader: Peter Holland, 11. In the league, only Calvin's Bart Conner was faster at the CIF final last year. Holland is the ringleader of a group of soccer players that use cross country for conditioning. The pack: Max Johnson, 12; Scott Hunter, 12; Taylor Rogers, 10; Jake Armstrong, 11. All return from last year's varsity. Johnson was last year's number two; Hunter had the best off-season preparation. Matt Lindeman, 10, could move into that group. Maybe: Patrick Kinnard, 11, is another soccer player that is "pretty strong." But he is undecided about trying out. If he does arrive, Svatek expects him to be near the top of the group.

The outlook: It definitely seems to be the best returning group outside of Calvin. Holland, a still developing runner, is very good, and he has an experienced group backing him up. The depth seems to be adequate. It would be a surprise if the team was lower than second.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 8-10. The leader: In almost any other year, Kaili Shumilak would have been the outstanding frosh runner in the league. Now a soph, Shumilak is the 26th fastest returning CIF cross country runner from the entire county, and she showed her talent in track, with a 5:22 for 1600. She was truly outstanding (the second best runner in the league), and, if more people didn't notice, it was only because of the presence of Angela Petersen. Shumilak is currently on the shelf, however, and will not be able to resume training until the end of September. The pack: Only other varsity returner is Ana Landa, 11. The outlook: Svatek brought her team to wins over strong favorite Francis Parker in the league finals and the CIF championships. It was about as good of a coaching job as was accomplished by anybody locally last year. This year, the challenge is slightly different. All of the better teams are scrambling to find a capable five. Svatek has two things in her favor: a strong track record of finding and developing depth; and she probably has enough good athletes to do the job.

Depth: Stout has at least seven other runners that will compete for that seventh spot. The top six are, "a really solid core."

The outlook: Great. The team is the class of the league, and strong favorites to repeat as CIF Division V champs. The real focus is on the state meet, where the team is looking to improve on their seventh of last year. Stout does a great job, he has the horses, and the runners have taken the challenge. "They are real fired up about this," Stout said. "They have been working pretty hard." It's going to be a good year.

The outlook: The team has respectable talent, and Stout always gets the maximum out of what he has. They wouldn't be the league favorite, but they shouldn't be dismissed, either.

Horizon

Division: Five. Coach: Zack Jones. Course:

The program: Cross country is a relatively new sport to Horizon, which fields powerhouse teams in a number of other sports. Last year, there was one girl, Robin Owen, a member of the CIF championship basketball team.

La Jolla C'ntry Day

Division: Five. Coach: Renee Milton. Course: UCSD.

BOYS:

Numbers: 7-8. The leader: Jared Ziman, 11. He's the eighth-fastest returning league runner from last year's CIF meet. The pack: The Torres return six of their seven varsity runners from last year, including Kevin Weinberg, 10; Andrew Garrett, 10; Daniel Pike, 12; Nick Shiftan, 11; and Mike Blumberg, 12. Add to that mix Rashaan Allen, 10, who played football last year.

The outlook: Ziman is a solid runner in the number one slot, and the Torres benefit from the stability of having most of their team return. The talent is no match for league favorite Calvin Christian, but the team could be competitive with Bishop's for the next slot.

GIRLS: Numbers: 6-7. The leader: Carly Gardner, 9. She's a soccer player, just running to keep in shape, but she's very talented. She had one of the fastest times of the day at the Wolfpack Invite, ahead of such people as Sarah Wilkins and Heather Shurtleff, so keep an eye on her. The core: The Torres bring back their top two runners from last year, Lindsay Weinberg, 12, and Daniella Scarfeo, 10. Transfer Veronica Gepner, 11, is also capable. To this point on the roster, the team is as good as there is in the league. Depth: This was the kick-

er for Country Day last year. They had four very good runners, and a big dropoff. Milton is hard at work trying to find some likely recruits, or the team may be in the same situation.

The outlook: If Milton can find even just one or two more competitive runners, the team can race with anybody in the league.

Francis Parker

Division: Five. Coach: John Lown, assisted by Jori Jackman, Matt Schellenberg and Wes Williams. Course: Tecolote Canyon. Girls will run three miles.

BOYS:

Numbers: 10-15. The leader: Karl Rinderknecht, 12. He splits time with club soccer, which is why he doesn't show up on the CIF list above, even though he was also the team's best last year. The pack: Shane McElreavy, 11; Bob Sise, 11; David Szeles, 10; Mark Shtayerman, 12; Kalyan Pokala, 11; Greg Feldman, 10; John Aires, 9; Dwight Carey, 9. McElreavy and Sise were among the team's best last year; Szeles, Shtayerman and Pokala are also varsity returnees.

The outlook: Lown has a veteran group, with a few new candidates to add depth. They should be competitive in the league.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 5-10. The unquestioned leader: Angela Petersen, 10. Locally, she was second only to Hilltop's Davila, whom she beat once in cross country. In track, she was easily the county's best 3200 runner, clocking 10:58 (second best time was 11:13), and she also ran a 5:02 1600. This year she returns with more experience and better conditioning. She took some time off right after track, but returned to training by attending a high-altitude camp. A very big fish in a pretty small pond, Petersen will find her main competition on the invitational circuit, at least until the state meet. The pack: Must be rebuilt from scratch, as graduation and moves have taken the team's 2 through 8 runners. Best candidates are Megan Witte, 11; Sarah Kauffman, 9; and Elizabeth Mannino, 10. Also expected to contend for varsity status are Amanda Wheeler, 9; Rebecca Dunaway, Becky Neri; Megan Cosgriff-Hernandez, 12; and transfer Sari Singer, 11.

The outlook: The number one is gold, but Lown must piece together a backup group. If he can, the team could be a contender in league and at

Division: Four. Coach: Eric

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. Prospects: Bret D'Vincent, 12; Troy Geierman, 9; Nick Teach, 9; Erik Lea, 11; Sam Lituin, 11. D'Vincent, an all-around athlete, returns from last year's small team.

The outlook: The team is just really getting off the ground (they had five entries in the CIF meet last year), but already the outlook is much improved. They have huge numbers, by small school standards, and the school is located in an area with abundant talent.



El Cap's boys dominated the small schools race, going one-two and putting six into the top ten.



Petersen and Davila ran together for the first half of the race, although it seemed that Davila was often setting the pace, and that Petersen was following. Petersen drew even ascending the hill, and took control as Davila began to look distressed. From there, the gap widened to a full minute.
