




Scripps Ranch is unbeaten in the Western League after beating St. Augustine this week. We survey the best of the dual meet action, starting on page three.


Some great duals are still on tap, including big showdowns in the Metro and Palomar Leagues, and among the Western League's best girls teams. See page five.

The most recent local and state rankings are on page twelve. St. Augustine moves up, and Sweetwater's boys join the top ten.

Checking in with...

Who's making news... SAN DIEGO

The Cavers boys team is probably the best unit that nobody really knows about.

They are easily the class of the Eastern League, and they have been making their mark in some out-oftown invitationals, led by a strong one-two punch.

Coach Ed Ramos' team won the small schools division of the Santa Clarita Invitational on October 16, as soph Solomon Kumbi won the 3.0-mile race in 15:31, with teammate Christian Dominguez the runnerup, in 15:37. Dominguez is a junior.

In the Raider Invitational, at College Park on October 1, San Diego was fifth, behind Camarillo and Righetti, among others. Kumbi was second in that race, clocking 15:55.

At Woodbridge, on September 18, Dominguez was the second fastest local runner, clocking 15:34 for the 3.0-mile course, and Kumbi was timed in 16:03.

If the Caver pack is anywhere close to the top two, San Diego is a solid top ten team.

UNIVERSITY CITY

The Centurion boys team may soon add a talented frosh runner, Kern Huerta.

He has been ineligible to date, but he's ready to contribute as soon as he's cleared academically. He clocked 16:50 for 5K at the recent Arturo Barrios meet in Chula Vista. Coach Jim McCarthy thinks Huerta could fit in as high as third man on his varsity.

WEST HILLS

The Wolfpack are hoping to upgrade their roster by the end of the season, if soph Dustin Westergom-Flick makes grades. He also competed at the Arturo Barrios meet, and clocked 16:38 for 5K in winning the 13-17 age division.

ST. AUGUSTINE

Coach Jerry Downey has scheduled the annual Frosh/Soph Championships for Friday, October 29, at Morley Field.

Races will be held for Frosh and Sophs in both boys and girls divisions.

TORREY PINES

Doctors ruled out any participation this season by Jackie Appel, who was the Falcons' third runner last year. Appel was suffering from a stress fracture. She is a junior, and could be back next year.

The Falcons have a junior (Julie Komosinski) at the top of their roster, and the rest of their varsity pack are mostly sophs and frosh.

ANGELA PETERSEN

The junior runner, last year's runner of the year in the San Diego Section, is running well for her new school in Nevada.

She attends The Meadows, and she's unbeaten in invitationals in and around the Las Vegas area.

She won one race by two minutes, but has yet to meet up with another Nevada flash, Abby Miller of Green Valley. Miller was a Footlocker finalist as a frosh.

One internet report on a Nevada meet noted that, "Petersen is for real."

CARLSBAD

The Lancer girls will upgrade their roster when the championship meets begin.

Frosh Jessica Ansari is one of

the better ninth-grade girls to come on the scene this year, but she rarely competes in any but dual meets to this point.

Coach Keith Van Asdalan says that Ansari ranges in the twothree-four spot when she runs.

ST. AUGUSTINE

The Saints are another team that has a frosh weapon that is rarely seen, except in dual meets.

He is Sean Barrett, and he is solidly in the Saints' top five. He usually plays baseball on Saturdays, but he'll race at CIF.

In his one weekend appearance,

he won the small schools frosh/soph race at the Norseman Invite.

VALLEY CENTER

The Valley Center girls, easily the best Division IV team in the section, recently lost Maria Cervantes, who ranged in the twothree spot for the Jags. Cervantes moved to Orange Glen, where she will be eligible to run for the Patriots.

Valley Center still has a solid top five, but the loss of Cervantes will probably be felt when the Jaguars compete at the state level.



Dual Meets:


Scripps boys beat Saints; many league showdowns still to come

At about the halfway point of most teams' dual meet seasons, a number of leagues have already had big showdowns, most notably in the Western, Eastern and Palomar loops.

There have already been a pair of high-powered boys duals in the West. St. Augustine beat La Jolla 17 to 38 on October 11, with Saints going 1-2-3-5-6 against the Vikes, who couldn't seem to catch up to the Saints pack, which took out the pace hard early.

One week later, Scripps Ranch's boys hammered the Saints, 23-32, as the Falcons put runners in slots 2-3-4-5 behind the winner, Ryan Moorcroft.

The Scripps boys still have to face La Jolla on Monday. The Vikes will have something to prove, and they could put things in a three-way tie with an upset.

Other dual meet highlights: WESTERN:

St. Augustine's Moorcroft put up a dazzling 15:43 on the 3.0 mile Western League course in the loss to Scripps this week. Scripp's Brendan Riordan ran a pretty decent 16:02 in the race to lead the Scripps pack of four, which broke open the race just before the halfway point by moving away from the Saints' pack.

The Western league course has been reconfigured this year, while the Eastern and Harbor Leagues are running the Morley layout as they did last year, so times between leagues can't be compared.

In girls racing, La Jolla and
University City haven't met yet,
and both have been cruising
through their duals. Fastest time
to date was UC's Chessa AdsitMorris' clocking of 19:04 in a trimeet on Monday. La Jolla's
Desiree Leek has racked up a 19:27
in a meet on October 11 with
University of San Diego and Our
Lady of Peace.

In duals that held significance for the CIF Division III race, the USD boys beat Mission Bay by a big score on October 5; and Our Lady of Peace girls took care of USD by 17-38 on October 11.



The best Western Division III teams will be CIF contenders at the end of the year.

EASTERN:


San Diego's boys have been laying waste to their opponents so far. They beat their top rival, Point Loma, 20-36, on October 14, led by Christian Dominguez and Solomon Kumbi. Dominguez was timed in 16:05 on the Eastern League course (different than the Western layout), and Kumbi was just steps behind. It was the fastest race of the year in the East, and it put the Cavers in control, at least until the league finals.

Mira Mesa's girls topped Point Loma on October 7, by 25-30, despite a win by Pointer Natalie Parks in 16:31 over the 2.6-mile Eastern course at Morley. That remains the fastest girls time by an Eastern runner this season. Mira Mesa is led by the duo of Dori McGuire and freshman Lisa Dodd, who have both dipped under 17 minutes at Morley this year. There won't be a tougher opponent for Mira Mesa until the league finals, when the teams will be matched up again.


HARBOR:

The Harbor League bases everything on their dual meet schedule, so the boys race seems to be over after Crawford beat Coronado, 23-33, on October 13. The Colts were led by defending league champ, Simon Peter.

The girls league picture is a bit more unclear. Coronado usually dominates this league, and they are probably the best of the group again this season, based on limited results. The Coronado/Crawford girls dual saw a number of girls get

lost on the course, and the final results were completely thrown out. The two teams, if needed, can make up their dual within the league finals.

METRO:

There have been few significant clashes in the South Bay, as Chula Vista, Sweetwater and Bonita Vista await a three-way clash next week.

Boys teams from Sweetwater and Chula Vista have not been challenged at all in early action, and Bonita Vista's boys also remain unbeaten, although Mar Vista did give them a good run on October 8. The Barons beat the Mariners, 27-32 at Lucky Waller Park.

Likewise, the Bonita and Chula girls teams are cruising through the early meets.

Best individuals have been Chula's Michael Manzano, Sweetwater's Ruben Vences, and

Mar Vista's Blake Swier among the boys. Hilltop's Desiree Davila has dominated the girls league races.

VALLEY:

The boys race still seems to be up for grabs at this point, although Valley Center has an edge with a big win (24-31) over San Pasqual on October 8.

San Pasqual is scuffling a bit, at least compared to last year, when they dominated this league on their way to a second-place finish at the State Meet in Division II. Now, the league is full of contenders.

"We had to run hard to beat Ramona (26-29, on September 30)," Golden Eagle coach Pat King said. "And then Valley Center beat us."

Escondido is also in the mix, but their top runner, Nico Cueva, is just coming back off the injured list.

In girls racing, the two best

teams, Valley Center and Ramona, have yet to meet.

AVOCADO:

The Fallbrook boys team has been in cruise control to this point, and it's unclear if there is a legitimate challenger among their rivals.

On the girls side, Torrey's strong team is a clear favorite to continue unbeaten, although they have yet to face Carlsbad or Fallbrook, both quality teams. La Costa Canyon's girls gave Fallbrook a good race on October 8, with the Warriors winning by 26-29 on their home course. LCC's Morgan Soule ran a 17:13 on the 2.7-mile Fallbrook campus course.

PALOMAR:

This is the league of duals to the death, meaning that some of the county's (and the state's) best teams are forced to run more hard races than they would like.


Three of the county's best four boys teams, Poway, Vista and Mt. Carmel will take turns banging on each other in duals and at their league finals.

The county's two best girls teams (at least, arguably), Rancho Bernardo and Mt. Carmel, will have gone head to head four times before they match up again at the CIF finals.


It's the strongest league, top to bottom, in the county. So much so, in fact, that some of the teams that are struggling for dual meet wins are in fact quality teams, such as the Rancho Bernardo and San Marcos boys, or the Vista and Rancho Buena Vista girls.

Biggest clash in boys racing so far was Poway's big win (19



points) over Mt. Carmel on the Sundevils' course on October 8.
Although the scoring was one-sided, the Mt. Carmel pack was close to the Poway pack. "It was the closest blowout I've ever seen," one observer said.

Vista and Poway boys meet next week; Vista and Mt. Carmel boys go one week later. The next week, all three go at it in the Palomar finals.

San Marcos' Travis Laird has looked good, winning meets against Vista and Rancho Bernardo. San Marcos' boys beat RB, 23-32 on October 8.

Rancho Bernardo's and Mt.
Carmel's girls don't really have any viable challengers in the league.
They meet in the last dual of the season, and they continue to match up in succeeding weeks, at league, at CIF, and, possibly, at State.

At the next level, Rancho Buena Vista topped Vista on October 8, with RBV's Nastassaja Hall leading the way. Poway's girls have run into RB and Mt. Carmel on successive weeks, so it's hard to tell where they stand.

GROSSMONT NORTH:

It's been all West Hills, both in boys and girls racing. The Wolfpack are as strong as they've ever been, and some of the other league teams are a bit down. The Wolfpack teams should both continue unbeaten.

In boys racing, El Capitan edged Grossmont, 28-31, at Lindo Lakes on October 15. Foothiller Matt Heibel won the race.

In girls racing, El Cap's girls also edged Grossmont at Lindo, by 27-30.

GROSSMONT SOUTH:

Granite Hills' boys team has already topped Valhalla, Helix and Monte Vista in duals, and Ryan Maynard has remained unbeaten in league meets.

In girls racing, top rivals Valhalla and Helix have yet to meet. Both are unbeaten to date.

COASTAL:

Calvin Christian's boys, the league and CIF Division V favorite, are unbeaten in league duals to date.

The Calvin girls are also in control in their league, after a 24-35 win over San Dieguito Academy on September 30. San Dieguito's Jenna Timinsky won the race. La Jolla Country Day could threaten the Crusaders, based on their showing at the St. Augustine Invitational.

SOUTHERN:

To this point, best showings have been by the Mountain Empire boys squad, and the Holtville and Julian girls teams.

The Mountain Empire boys beat Holtville, probably their top rival, 22-33 on October 7 at Heise Park in Julian.

The Holtville girls won by forfeit over Julian on the same day, but Julian put a full team together a week later and bested Mountain Empire.

It remains to be seen how Julian, with a full team, compares to Holtville, or how good Mountain Empire, with strong front runners, might be if they can field a full unit.

Some of the best meets are still to come...

Among the significant dual meets yet to happen:

Ranch, at Morley Field, on Monday, October 25. A Scripps boys win puts them in the driver's seat. A La Jolla boys win puts three teams in a tie going into the finals. La Jolla's girls should win, although Scripps is a quality team.


Vista vs. Poway, at Guajome Park, Friday, October 29. Two of the state's best boys teams meet again. The girls teams will be scrapping for a possible county ranking spot.

Sweetwater, Chula
Vista and Bonita Vista, at
Rohr Park in Chula Vista, on
Friday, October 29. All three
boys teams are unbeaten in
the Metro League. The Chula
and Bonita girls teams are
also unbeaten.

Jolla, on Monday,
November 1, at Morley Field.
The two girls teams are
unbeaten in the league, and
seem closely matched. It will
be a preview of their CIF
Division II matchup next
month.

Helix vs. Valhalla, on Friday, November 5, at a site to be announced. Both girls teams are unbeaten. The boys teams will be fighting for second place in the league's dual standings, behind Granite Hills.


Vista, Mt. Carmel and Rancho Bernardo, on Friday, November 5, at Rancho Bernardo Community Park. The Vista and Mt. Carmel boys get after it, with a good RB team thrown into the mix, but most eyes will be on the girls meet, with RB and Mt. Carmel resuming their rivalry. 

St. Augustine's boys used their own invitational to blow past the field at Morley Field on October 8.


Saint runners Ryan Moorcroft, Drew Bouchard, Sean Barrett and Matt Herriman went 1-2-3-4 to easily outclass their opposition. The Calvin Christian boys team won the Division V scoring.

San Dieguito Academy's Jenna Timinsky won her race by a full minute, running 17:02 on the CIF championship course, and Coronado's and Calvin Christian's girls won Division IV and V titles.


Prominent among the missing were the excellent Valley Center boys and girls teams. They were engaged in a league dual meet that day.

Moorcroft and Timinsky, the winners here, are the logical and strong favorites in the CIF Division IV race next month.


The St. Augustine meet is an annual sneak preview of some of

That means that Army Navy
Academy's Will Kramer and Calvin
Christian's Chad Young will be
among the favorites in the CIF
Division V race, along with
Bishop's Peter Holland, who didn't
run in this race. Kramer was 0:10
seconds ahead of Young on this
day.

It could also mean that Mountain Empire's Lily Dowlatshahie will be a favorite in the girls Division V race, along with Kaili Shumilak of Bishop's, who has yet to race this year. Dowlatshahie was the runner-up to Timinsky, in 18:03, and she was almost a minute ahead of the next Division V runner, Calvin Christian's Elana Huff.

Closest Division IV runners to Timinsky in the race were Clairemont's Jen Wirkus (19:04) and Coronado's Emily Trepasso (19:06). It is probable that Timinsky's closest competition at CIF will come from Valley Center's Diana Dibble and her teammates.

A few Division III teams
(University of San Diego,

championships, which were only

San Luis Obispo:

Torrey's girls close to Pen

Torrey Pines' girls team may have run their best team meet of the season last week, when they finished second at the San Luis Obispo Invitational.

The Falcons scored 42 points, behind winner Peninsula's 33 points. Peninsula went into the meet as the state's top-ranked team in Division I.

Torrey's Julie Komosinski won the 3.1-mile race in 18:27, with an 0:18-second margin of victory. She is unbeaten in invitationals this year, with wins at Mt. Carmel, South Bay and Stanford to her credit.

A trio of sophomores, Hailey Moore, Krista Romley and Lauren Jeffers, were 7-8-9 in the race for Torrey, but PenHi's top three were 3-4-5 in the race.

Torrey Pines coach Brent Thorne has seen some of the best competition in the state to date. He's been to Stanford, San Luis Obispo, the Sundevil and South Bay, and he's been most impressed with the level of competition in San Diego.

"I think Rancho Bernardo is the best girls team in California right now," he said. "I saw what they did at Southern Cal. There doesn't seem to be much of anything in northern California (in Division I girls)."

"I was talking to Joe Kelly (the Peninsula coach), and he said that it's just sick that this section only

sends two teams to the state meet," Thorne said.

Southern Cal Invitational:

RB outruns great girls field; top boys race thrown out


Rancho Bernardo's girls team must be tired of being ranked fifth in the state.

They dominated the Southern California Invitational last week, where the girls field included, according to the state rankings, four of the top six girls teams in the state.

The Bronco girls blistered the Guajome Park course, and they finished with a healthy margin of victory over Mt. Carmel, Yucaipa and Sultana of Hesperia. Those teams came into the meet ranked, respectively, second, fourth and sixth in the state's Division I. None of them were a match for the on-fire Broncos, who put up three of the four fastest times of the day, and won the first three races in impressive fashion.

The Southern Cal meet is unique in that it matches up runners in races according to their roster spots on their teams. Thus, number ones from each team compete in one race, followed by numbers twos in another race, and so on, through seven. Winning teams are determined by adding the times from all seven runners.

The format hit a bit of a snag on the boys side, where the entire field of number one runners were

officially disqualified after running the course incorrectly.

Boys team titles were then determined by using times from the second through seventh runners, and it swung the large schools' title from West Hills to Mt. Carmel.

About midway through the boys number one race, Ramona's Matt McInvale, with a solid lead, took a wrong turn and reversed the route on the lake loop. The entire field followed him on his errant path.

The runners ended up running the same distance as in other races, but in a different fashion that some coaches thought resulted in faster times. Thus, the mass DQs.

West Hills' boys thought they had the meet won, but they lost the 0:29-second advantage that Evan Fox established over Mt. Carmel's Chris Kenyon in that race. With those times both thrown out, Mt. Carmel's team edged the Wolfpack by 0:13 seconds.

One consolation prize for the Wolfpack was number two runner Ben Aragon getting the award for Fastest Time of the Day. None of the boys in the number one race, including race winner McInvale, were eligible for those awards either.

No controversy marred Rancho Bernardo's girls big win, however.

In the girls number one race, RB's Julie Manson began a bit conservatively, trailing San Marcos' Nicole Mier and Mt. Carmel's Janet Mulvey for the first half of the race.

"It seemed that they were

pushing pretty hard at the start," Manson said, "so I didn't try to keep up."

When the runners reappeared at the crossroads, Manson was solidly in front.

"I don't know if I speeded up, or if they slowed down a bit, but it was probably a combination of the two," Manson said.

The RB senior finished in 14:29 to win over a great field that included Mier (14:37), Mulvey (14:55) and Yucaipa's Heidi Walker (15:00).

RB's Allison Hall had much less trouble in the girls number two race, winning in 14:34, ahead of Mt. Carmel's Deanna Sick (15:00).

Then, teammate Kaleena Yee ran 14:52 to win the girls number three race, ahead of Yucaipa's Leeann Jimenez (15:24).

Other good efforts for the Broncos included Jamie Doyle's second in the number four race (in 15:12), Mikaelyn Austin's second in the number six race (in 16:02), and Sarah Lochmiller's second in the seven race (in 16:32).

The only RB entrant to run "off" was Katie Boyd, who was sixth in the number five race, after being sick all week.

Mt. Carmel's girls ran well, taking second, ahead of Yucaipa and Sultana, but they were more than two minutes behind Rancho Bernardo. Their best efforts came from Mulvey, Sick and Ashlee Dere, who won the number five race.

A number of excellent girls teams were missing one or more key runners on the day (most of them were taking college boards).


Carlsbad, Bonita Vista, Vista, Valley Center, La Costa Canyon and Ramona all had one or two key varsity members otherwise engaged, and La Jolla was missing five of their top seven.

By contrast, most of the boys teams were at full strength, although Vista elected to hold out their top six runners. Justin Neuroth and his mates were there. scouting, along with members of the Poway team.

The boys number one race, a bit swept under the rug because of the irregularities, featured another fine effort by McInvale.

He was timed in 15:40 in winning the race in solid fashion over San Marcos' Travis Laird (15:49), Fox (15:54) and RB's Sean Ricketts (15:54).

It was a bigger margin of victory over Laird than McInvale posted at the Mt. Carmel Invite last month. Laird continued to prove his mettle, with a solid lead over Fox

and Ricketts, who dueled to the wire for the third spot.


McInvale's misadventures included, in addition to the wrong turn, a slip and a fall on the last of the hairpin turns on the final downhill. He lost little time in getting back into the race.

Mt. Carmel was a bit more balanced across the board, with high placings from Alan Aradanas (second among number twos); Mike Cooke (second among number threes); Ben Bruce (second among number fours); Sergio Esquivel (fourth among number fives); Mike Zahalan (second among number sixes); and Abadir Barre (winner of number sevens).

The Sundevils are probably the deepest team in the county from the seven spot on down, and their B team outran many varsity teams.

The CIF Division I boys final will be a study in contrasts. Among the serious contenders, West Hills and Vista are strongest at spots one-two-three; Poway is probably the best at spots fourfive-six, with Mt. Carmel right behind them.


Analyzing the Southern Cal Invite:

The Southern California Invitational, held last week at Guajome Park, has a unique format.


Each race is a showdown between one entrant from each team, arranged in a hierarchical order, beginning with each squad's best runner (the number ones).

The runners in that race reversed a loop of the course in mid-race. The total distance was the same, but some coaches felt that the variant resulted in faster times.

The end result was that the boys final standings were based on races for runners two through seven.

As one coach put it, "If you run off course, you are disqualified."

That's fair enough for purposes of determining the race team winners (and Track Magazine does not dispute the official results), but it's not helpful in determining the relative strength of the teams.

For instance, Mt. Carmel's boys won the large school award, ahead of West Hills. Among the results thrown out were Evan Fox's 15:54 for the Wolfpack, and Chris Kenyon's 16:23 for the Sundevils.

We went ahead and ranked the teams the traditional way, counting the top five times for each squad. We included the results from the boy's number one race, because all teams were affected in equal measure. After all, each of the runners in that race ran an identical course, and the final times were a fair measure of their relative ability. It would be much more of a distortion to discard those results.
