Division I boys:


What will the weather do? The race starts at 1:30 in the afternoon. Will it be hot?

How key will runners like Maynard, Christian Dominguez and Michael Manzano be? Can they place high enough to be factors in the team race?



The thrill of victory; the agony of the feet...

League finals week. It's one crazy week.

The cross country championships are spaced from Monday to Saturday, offering the opportunity for a fanatic to see almost everything

I made it to the Western League on Monday afternoon, to the Harbor League on Tuesday afternoon, to the Eastern League on Thursday morning, to the Metro League on Friday afternoon, and to the Valley, Palomar and Avocado meets on Saturday morning.

It's time to take inventory.

Total mileage driven, including an extra trip to get film developed: 1,002 miles.

Rolls of film exposed: 13 rolls of 36 photos apiece. That's 468 exposures.

Number of visits to Starbucks: Sorry, I lost count.

But it wasn't all a blur. Some things stood out. Some things were revealed later, after looking at results, and making simple calculations.

Here's some of what I observed during the six days of intense competitions.

Most dominant team in their own league:

Has to be West Hills in the Grossmont North. In the boys race, they scored just 18 points, going 1-2-3-4. In the girls race, they totaled just 22 points, going 2-3-4-5 behind El Cap's Jasmine Marquez.

The only other team to win boys and girls team championships was Mountain Empire.

Biggest margin of victory, by an individual:

Jenna Timinsky won the Coastal League race by 1:15 over Kaili Shumilak.

In boys racing, the biggest win was by Chula Vista's Michael Manzano, who took the Metro by 0:46 seconds. One Metro observer watched Manzano, and said, "That's a Davila-sized lead."

There were lots of one-sided races during the week.

On the girls side, Mountain Empire's Lily Dowlatshahie won by 0:57 seconds, and Hilltop's Desiree Davila won the Metro by 0:51 seconds (now, THAT was a Davila-sized lead).

Closest individual races:

There were none that went right down to the wire. Valley Center's Ryan Skerl had the narrowest margin, 0:03 seconds over teammate Cooper Bachman. On the girls side, Mira Mesa's Lisa Dodd won by 0:05 seconds over

teammate Dori McGuire.

The old one-two.

Teammates placed first and second in six different races. And West Hills' boys went 1-2-3-4 in their league race, led by Evan Fox.

Curiously, two of the one-two combos did not result in team wins. Mira Mesa's Dodd and McGuire and their team went to a tie-breaker and lost that to Point Loma. And Torrey Pines' Julie Komosinski and Krista Romley were outgunned by a great Carlsbad effort.

Lowest scores, boys teams:

West Hills' boys scored 18 in the Grossmont North race.

Sweetwater's boys scored 25 in the Metro race.

Lowest scores, girls teams:

West Hills' girls scored 22 on the Grossmont North.

Valhalla's girls scored 26 in the Grossmont South race.

Highest winning score (and closest meet), boys:

Mt. Carmel scored 50, in winning a thrilling race in the Palomar. Poway and Vista each scored 53, with Poway taking the tie-breaker.

Highest winning score (and closest meet), girls:

Point Loma scored 45, the same as Mira Mesa, and needed a tie-breaker to edge Mira Mesa.

Most curious score:

In the Grossmont South girls race, Valhalla scored 26 points, and Helix was the runner-up with 30. That's like a dual meet score. The two teams shared the first 13 places between them.

Christmas shopping tip:

If Vista's Justin Neuroth is on your gift list, be advised: he hates ties. So, don't buy him neckties, railroad ties, a box of twist ties, a coupon for Thai food, or a gift certificate for Tae-Bo lessons.

Tighest packs, boys (winning teams):

Mt. Carmel's five ran 0:21 seconds, in out-packing Poway.

0:29, Calvin Christian.

0:35, Scripps Ranch.

0:39, Sweetwater.

Tightest packs, girls (winning teams):

0:27, West Hills.

0:39, Valhalla. 0:56, Chula Vista.

1:00, Carlsbad.

Everybody was a winner.

Well, it seemed that way.

Thirty-two different schools had either a team champion, or cochampion, or an individual champion, in either boys or girls racing.

Youngest winners, boys:

Army Navy soph Will Kramer. Valley Center soph Ryan Skerl.

Youngest winners, girls:

Mira Mesa frosh Lisa Dodd. San Dieguito Academy soph Jenna Timinsky.

Helix soph Stephanie Baird.

Age trends:

Most of the girl winners will return. The only senior winners were Rancho Bernardo's Julie Manson, and Clairemont's Jen Wirkus. The girls class of 2001 includes league champs Julie Komosinski, Desiree Davila, Desiree Leek, Jasmine Marquez, Loretta Kilmer, and Lily Dowlatshahie. They may be soon be joined by Angela Petersen. More on that later.

The boys class of 2000 continues to amaze. Among the senior standouts taking league titles were Jon Rankin, Travis Laird, Ryan Moorcroft, Justin Mattos, Michael Manzano, Evan Fox, and Simon Peter. And that list doesn't include Matt McInvale, who didn't run his league race, or such standouts as Sean Ricketts, Justin Neuroth, Jared Emmons and Josh Pope, who are all bunched up in the Palomar League, or Ryan Maynard, the Grossmont South runner-up to Rankin's amazing race.

Fastest course:

My vote goes to the Western League layout.

Slowest course:

It could be the layout at Harry Griffin layout, over overgrown grassy fields. Only two runners,



Jason Finch and Rankin, have ever broken 16:00 minutes there.

Roughest race:

Bodies were flying everywhere in the Palomar boys race. There were some fast turns, a few narrow passages, and a thick pack of fast-moving runners. What is that they always say at the start of a race? "If you fall down after 100 yards, that's cross-country."

Deja Deja Vu:

The Eastern girls team race was a rerun of last year's tie, with Point Loma winning the tie-breaker against Mira Mesa each time. A rerun? During sweeps week?

Most unsettling feeling:

Eastern League coaches in their last year include Mira Mesa's Dennis Lottermoser and Point Loma's Steve Markland. They are two excellent coaches, and both go down on the all-time nice guy list. Markland has to quit to attend to business obligatons. Lottermoser is retiring.

Hottest rumor:

Angela Petersen moving back to this area, and enrolling at Torrey Pines. From all accounts, the move is in the works.

Western:

Scripps boys best; La Jolla girls rule

The Western League finals seem to bring out the best in the Scripps Ranch boys team.

They ran a strong team race to win the meet, giving them the league championship. Scripps, La Jolla and St. Augustine all finished the dual season with one loss apiece, making the final a winnertake-all affair.

La Jolla's girls, meanwhile, continued their strong running, winning comfortably against a University City team that had their best race of the year.

Individual winners, in course record times, were St. Augustine's Ryan Moorcroft (15:27 for 3.0) and La Jolla's Desiree Leek (18:14 for 3.0). The Western course was just reconfigured this year, so the course records only include races from this season.

La Jolla's girls withstood a strong challenge from UC's talented crew. UC's Katherine Ziegler (second) and Chessa Adsit-Morris (third) ran their best races of the year.

Mission Bay soph Rose Serna, who was fifth in 18:50, also looked very good.

The Vikings had to make do without Maggie Sass, one of their top runners. She was pulled from the race by La Jolla girls coach Tom Dorman, after she struggled with a leg injury. The Vikes still had enough depth to beat UC by nine points. They'll be a solid favorite in the CIF Division II race.


If UC's girls run like they did in this race, they'll be a very strong contender for that second state meet qualifying spot.

The Western League boys race has flip-flopped among the top three teams all year.

In duals, St. Augustine beat a listless-looking La Jolla team. Then Scripps whacked the Saints. A week later, a much-improved La Jolla team outraced Scripps. Scripps returned the favor here, but the two teams will lock up again in the CIF Division II race.

Keys for Scripps were great efforts from Raphael Machado, who was second in 15:33, and the other scorers. Brendan Riordan was fifth in 15:48, and he was followed by Mike Comstock (seventh), Jonathan Hester (eighth) and Matt Wexler (tenth).

La Jolla also ran strongly, with

Scott Davis (third), Eric Koster (fourth) and Chris Ferrier (sixth). Ferrier paid the price after trying to chase Moorcroft in a fast first mile.

After Moorcroft in first, Scripps and La Jolla dominated the top ten, taking eight of the remaining nine spots.

St. Augustine did not run badly, with their second through fifth runners finishing between 16:15 and 16:37, but they couldn't match up with La Jolla and Scripps here.

The Saints will compete in the CIF Division IV race, where they'll face a strong challenge from a good Valley Center team.


Harbor: Chief girls take title;

Colt boys look good

Clairemont's girls, behind a onetwo finish by Jen Wirkus and Rebecca Garcia, won the Harbor League final, which decided the girls league championship.

It's uncharacteristic for the finals to decide anything in this league, where the custom is for dual meets to decide championships.

Crawford's boys, already crowned the league champs based on an unbeaten dual meet record, raced well enough here to win the

meet, but it wasn't scored.

They did provide the individual boys champ in senior Simon Peter, who showed his fitness with a 16:11 for the 3.0 mile course.

Teammate Idrise Osman, a freshman, was runner-up in 16:47.

The Harbor League boys used the same course used by the Western League in the previous day's racing, so the times from the two meets can be directly compared.

The Colts had two other top ten finishers, and showed enough overall strength to contend this week in the CIF Division III race.

Clairemont's girls put together a good team race behind their top two. They also had finishers take 10th, 12th and 13th.

Coronado's girls, the preseason favorite, were without team leader Emily Trepasso for this race.

The Islanders, usually the best in the league, have had a tough year. They lost promising soph Kristina Nugent just before the season began. She transferred to West Hills, where she is one of their top runners.

Still, Coronado had girls in third, fourth and sixth to make it competitive.


The Harbor final took on an added dimension when coaches decided to score the meet this year. The results of a regular season dual meet between Coronado and Crawford was thrown out after a significant number of runners went off course. Thus, the Harbor final decided the girls title, and Clairemont's team rose to the occasion.




Calvin Christian's boys team, and the Bishop's girls team won their races at the Coastal League finals last week.

The Bishop's girls were a surprise. When the season began, coach Wendy Svatek didn't even have a scoring team.


She built up the team during the season, adding people like soccer player Debbie Sedlak, who was third in the race.

The individual winners, Chula's Michael Manzano, and Hilltop's Desiree Davila, raced to huge wins.


Manzano had a 0:46-second margin over Sweetwater's Ruben Vences, and Davila had a 0:51second win over Chula Vista's Sophia Marquez.

Ramona's Matt McInvale, the class of an excellent group of local senior boys, sat out the meet.


According to Ramona coach Dave Wilson, McInvale will be ready to race at the CIF finals.





The Rancho Bernardo girls won convincingly against a Mt. Carmel girls team that is ranked third in the state.


But RB is ranked first in the state, and they've been living up to that ranking in recent races, including this meet.




Carlsbad's win in the finals made them co-champions with Torrey Pines, after Torrey sailed through the dual season unbeaten.

three runner.


