The final invitationals of the year will be completed this weekend, and the area's cross country teams will now turn their focus onto finishing up their dual meet seasons and preparing for the championship meets.

At this time of year, everything starts to become magnified, with coaches, reporters, fans and athletes scrutinizing results and looking for trends, for clues, for weaknesses among rivals.

This issue is devoted to looking at these trends.

Who's running well? Who's starting to put it together? Who, if anybody, is starting to become a bit unraveled? Are there new impact athletes that are coming onto the scene? Any unexpected names that might make some waves in the big meets just over the horizon?

We take an in-depth look at the Southern Cal Invitational to find out how those teams competed.


We also take an in-depth look at the small school divisions, with some information coming from the St. Augustine Invitational two weeks ago.

News Briefs: Sections can 'float' divisions

In a move calculated to relieve pressure on individual sections, each state section can determine the boundaries between divisions, within limits.

The San Diego Section, which is top heavy with large schools, will probably adopt a recommendation from the coaches advisory committee to put the upper boundaries of Divisions IV, III and II as high as possible, thus taking off some of the pressure in Division I.

By state mandate, Division V will remain fixed at the enrollment of 350 students and below.

The enrollment figures are determined each October, and include students from 10th through 12th grades.

State officials will meet on Oct. 27 to make a final decision on the plan, which is expected to be approved.

Under this proposal, the San Diego Section's Division I will have 20 teams, ranging from 1700 students on up. Under the old guidelines, Division I could have had up to 30 teams, which would have made for degraded racing conditions.

Division II will range from 1350 to 1700 students, with 23 schools in that range.

Division III includes schools with enrollments ranging from 900 to 1350, with 13 teams in that range.

Division IV will still be marginal, with maybe 10 schools eligible to compete, but many of those programs do not have full teams, and two of the schools, St. Augustine and Army Navy Academy, only have boys enrolled.

State rules require that, at the section championship meet, eight full teams be entered in each race for the local section to be able to send its full complement of two teams plus five individuals.

That requirement has come into play in the last few years, with Valley Center's boys team not qualifying for the state meet last year in Division IV, after they finished second to an excellent St. Augustine squad.

A year before that, there was controversy in Division III, as a few of the area's coaches pressured some of the teams to field full squads. The result was that one team showed up with recently recruited athletes that basically jogged and walked their way through the race.

Division III shouldn't have that

problem, partly because it has been beefed up by the addition of three schools from Imperial Valley; Brawley, Central Union of El Centro, and Southwest of El Centro, all of which have thriving cross country programs.

Division IV is still sketchy, especially on the girls side, where there could be as few as four or five full teams taking the line at CIF. Best case scenario for the boys is eight full teams.

Frosh/Soph meet nears

The St. Augustine Frosh/Soph Cross Country Invitational is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 27, at Morley Field.

First race is the Frosh Girls at 3:15 p.m., followed by Frosh Boys, Soph Girls and Soph Boys, at 25 minute intervals.







Dual Meet Roundup:

Some leagues settled: some have big meets on horizon

At press time, it is approximately mid-season in most league dual-meet seasons, but there have been some significant developments

Some leagues, most notably the split Metro halves, have already determined their dual champs.

Other leagues, most notably the Palomar, will go to the season's final day to stage such crucial showdowns as the Vista-Poway boys, or the Torrey Pines-Mt. Carmel girls.

Most of the leagues have had a light schedule this week and last, allowing teams to keep fresh for the last round of invitationals.

Of course, in almost every league, the dual meet championships are just one part of the equation. Most leagues will determine overall champions using a combination of dual meet wins and performance in the league championship meet. The Harbor League is one that determines titles based completely on dual results.

Here's a quick overview of what's happened to this point.

Palomar: Showdowns loom

BOYS: Vista and Poway, which are ranked as the one-two teams in the section, are heading for a showdown. They are the only unbeaten teams in this tough league, with both being 2-0.

Vista beat a tough Mt. Carmel squad, 20-34 on Sept. 29; and Poway kept pace by beating an improved Rancho Buena Vista team, 22-33, on Oct. 6.

They'll meet on the season's last day, along with Rancho Bernardo, in a double dual. The meet is scheduled for Friday, Nov. 3, at Rancho Bernardo Community Park.

Mt. Carmel and RBV are both 1-1 in league meets.

"Poway ran really well," RBV coach Tom Lux said of the Oct. 6 race. "They really stepped it up and closed up that gap that they had."

GIRLS: This is the toughest league in the county in girls, with five of the six teams figuring somewhere in the rankings, and the big clashes have yet to happen.

Biggest news to date was Mt. Carmel's 24-33 win over Rancho Bernardo on Oct. 5, on the



Sundevil course. It was the first dual loss for RB's girls in years, but the Sundevils showed why they are top-ranked in the section.

Torrey Pines is also 2-0 in the league, with wins over Poway and Vista, and the Falcons are starting to put it together.

RB and Poway are both 1-1 in the league, with both having 24-31 wins over a very good RBV squad.

Torrey will host the last two duals at San Dieguito Park. They'll meet RB on Friday, Oct. 27; and

then tangle with Mt. Carmel and RBV on Friday, Nov. 3.

Avo: Fallbrook boys, Carlsbad girls are 2-0

BOYS: There haven't been that many meets in this five-team league, but Fallbrook has looked sharp in wins over La Costa Canyon and Carlsbad in the early going. Two teams, San Marcos and La Costa Canyon, have only had one meet apiece at press time.

Best meets have been Fallbrook's 23-31 win over Carlsbad at Fallbrook, on Oct. 5, and San Marcos' 24-33 win over an improved El Camino team, also on Oct. 5.

Fallbrook used a 1-2-4-6 grouping to take control of their meet. San Marcos won their meet on superior depth.

GIRLS: Carlsbad needed every bit of their depth to beat Fallbrook, 28-29, on Oct. 5. Lancer soph Jessie Ansari used a big kick to take second behind Fallbrook's Katie Matlack, but the Warriors' Jamie Carmichael and Maija Rohde were 3rd and 4th in the meet. The Lancers countered with a 5-6-7-8 finish, and their sixth runner displaced Fallbrook's fifth to swing the meet.

El Camino's sharply improved girls are 1-1 after blitzing San Marcos on Oct. 5. The Wildcats, led by sisters Sabrina and Sariah St. Laurent, went 1 through 5 against the Knights, who are still without Nicole Mier.

Valley: Both VC teams unbeaten

BOYS: Valley Center is 2-0 after wins against Oceanside (17-44, on Sept. 29) and Ramona (25-31, on Oct. 5). The Ramona meet was a classic matchup of a pack team against a team with great front-runners. VC's Gus Polito, Cooper Bachman and Ryan Skerl went 1-2-3 to clinch the dual win, and VC's fourth man, Tony Illig, also broke into the back of Ramona's scoring group.

Ramona, an excellent team, is 1-1 after a big win over San Pasqual (15-46 on Sept. 29). Escondido is 2-0 after wins over Orange Glen and San Pasqual, and they've recently added Stephen Servis to their roster.

This is a quality league. San Pasqual, a good team, is already sitting at 0-2 and has still to face Valley Center.

GIRLS: Things are very tight in this league. Valley Center is 2-0, but had a close meet with Ramona, winning 27-30, after the Bulldogs finished 1-2.

San Pasqual's young team is also 2-0, but had to go to a tie-breaker to beat Ramona. The team score was 29-29, but the Eagles had the faster sixth runner to get the win. Ramona, which is an excellent team, is 0-2 in the league.

West: UC girls, Saints boys lead

BOYS: St. Augustine has surprised many with a 5-0 record at press time, including wins over their toughest rivals.

The Saints have wins over Scripps Ranch (19-37), Hoover (21-38), University of San Diego (21-34), La Jolla (24-32), and Mission Bay. The Saints team that runs in the league meets is upgraded from the version that is on display in invitationals, with the added presence of Sean Barrett and Pat Barrett. Sean, a soph, moved into the number one slot in the St. Augustine Invite and the La Jolla/Uni duals, and Pat, a senior recovering from a pre-season injury, is a solid number five.

Another team that is a surprise is the University of San Diego. They are 2-1, with wins over University City and La Jolla. La Jolla is 3-2, but has made a habit of coming on strong late in the season.

GIRLS: University City remained unbeaten at 4-0, with a win over La Jolla on Wednesday,

Chessa Adsit-Morris led a 1-2 finish, but UC clinched the meet with depth, flooding across runners after La Jolla went 3-4-5. The Vikings are still not at full strength, with runners such as Michelle Guerrero, Maggie Sass and Katie Grim all still rehabbing from illness and/or injury.

Scripps Ranch is the next best team, at 2-1, but they have yet to face the league's better teams.

East: Both races are unsettled

BOYS: Biggest surprise to date was Point Loma's win over San Diego on Oct. 10. The Pointers were rebuilding with young runners, and the Cavers had been running well in early meets. But the Pointers used depth to turn the tide against a Caver team that was missing top runner Christian Dominguez. San Diego went 1-3. but the Pointers countered with a group, led by soph Brian Bradshaw, that finished 2-4-5-6. Patrick Henry is 2-0 to date, with easy wins over Morse and Serra. The Patriots still have yet to face the Pointers or Cavers.

GIRLS: The girls team race was expected to be a wide open contest among as many as six teams. At this point, Point Loma (3-0) and Serra (4-0) are in control, but the close meets have materialized. The Pointers have won big over Kearny (17-46), Morse (21-39) and San Diego (20-43), while Serra has wins over Patrick Henry (22-33), Morse (22-34), Kearny (18-41 and Mira Mesa (27-29).

The Serra/Mira Mesa race was in doubt all the way. The Marauders went one-two with Lisa Dodd and Dori McGuire, but

Serra, led by Amy Montgomery and frosh Lauren Lynaugh, had enough depth to win. Serra has missed the services of long-time mainstay Andrea Kahn, who has been out with injuries since early season.

Mira Mesa, which is 1-2, lost to San Diego on a tie-breaker in early season, and there have been any number of other close meets, including Henry's 27-29 win over

SoBay: Castle, Mar Vista on top

BOYS: Mar Vista made quick work of the new South Bay league. By the first week of October, they were 3-0 and cruising, with wins over Marian Catholic (15-50),

Castle Park (19-42), and Eastlake (22-33). They still have to face Hilltop, which is 1-1, but who lost to Eastlake, 20-39. Eastlake is 2-1, but still has to race Castle Park.

The Mariners, rebuilt from last year, are led by freshman Troy Swier.

GIRLS: Castle Park seems to be on the way to an unbeaten dual season, after wins over Mar Vista (15-50), and Hilltop (23-34). Hilltop has beaten Eastlake, a 2-1 team, by 24-37, and they will probably finish as the runner-up. The Trojans have four solid runners with excellent track credentials, and that has given them enough firepower against a young Eastlake team and a Hilltop team

led by Desiree Davila. The Trojans still have meets with Eastlake and Marian Catholic.

Mesa: Devils lead; Girls up for grabs

BOYS: Sweetwater has beaten their strongest rivals by big margins in running up a 3-0 record in duals.

First, the Devils outraced Bonita Vista, 19-44, on Sept. 29. One week later, they beat Chula Vista, 19-42, on Oct. 6, and effectively locked up the dual meet portion of the league title. Only Montgomery remains on the Sweetwater schedule.

Sweetwater coach Tim Latham was surprised at the scores, if not the victories.

"Chula Vista actually ran pretty well," he said. "A lot of them got PRs, but so did most of our runners."

GIRLS: This half of the Metro is a two-team race, and those two teams have yet to meet. Chula Vista is 3-0, and Bonita Vista is 2-0. Both have cruised to this point.

Chula has beaten Montgomery (18-43), Southwest (15-50), and Sweetwater (15-49). Bonita has wins over Sweetwater (15-50) and Montgomery (15-50). In both cases, the margin of victory is so one-sided that it's hard to get a read on the relative strengths of either the Spartans or the Barons. Both teams raced at Sundevil, but their runners were scattered among grade level races.

Gross North: Wolfpack, Hillers are 2-0

BOYS: West Hills has had things under control to this point, with big wins over El Capitan and Santana. Grossmont is also 2-0, with victories over Santana and an improved El Cajon Valley team. The Foothillers beat the Braves, 26-34. El Capitan is 2-1, with wins over Santana and El Cajon Valley. Grossmont has the toughest remaining schedule with meets against both West Hills and El Cap.

GIRLS: West Hills and Grossmont are both 2-0, but Grosmont has the more difficult schedule ahead. They'll face both West Hills and a 2-1 El Cap team led by Jasmine Marquez and Monica Hubbard. The league has decent depth.

West Hills, which has been ranked anywhere from two to four in the county all year, is strong,

fast and deep.

Gross South: Granite, Helix look solid

BOYS: Granite Hills is 3-0, including wins over Mount Miguel, Helix and Monte Vista. The Helix meet, as expected, was close, but the Eagles used depth to win at 25-31. Helix went one-two with Taylor Williams and Babey Wagnew, but Granite swept the

next five places to seal the win.

The Helix-Valhalla clash on Sept. 27 featured great up-front racing among Williams, Wagnew and the Norse's David Santos, with Williams eventually winning the race. The Highlanders took the meet, 25-30, and they are 2-1 in the league.

Still on the schedule is the Granite-Valhalla dual.

GIRLS: Helix is 3-0, with big wins over Valhalla (20-38), Granite Hills (18-45) and Mount Miguel. They are firmly in control of the dual meet title.

Valhalla is 1-1, but could end up with wins over both Granite and Mount Miguel.



BOYS: Clairemont has run up a 3-0 record, with wins over Christian (20-35), Crawford (17-42) and Madison (15-40), despite having only five runners competing. Coach Sean Stevenson has good quality on his roster, but he must be biting his fingernails in

GIRLS: Action has been sporadic in girls racing. There are only a handful of full scoring girls teams, and there have been few full-strength races. Coronado is probably the best team, at 2-0, but they have yet to face Madison, which is also 2-0.

Team titles are determined by adding the total time of each of seven runners entered in seven separate races.

Each team's number one runners race in one race; and other races include roster spots two through

Deconstructing So Cal The annual Southern California Invitational is a meet that is just

begging to be taken apart and analyzed. The very format puts a spotlight on each team's individual roster spots, from one through seven, and places a premium on each individual's performance.

There's nothing wrong with that format, but for our purposes, we tweaked the results just a bit. Our team times are based on each squad's fastest five runners, which puts the results a bit closer to the mark of an actual championship meet.

In addition, we listed many of the most notable absentee runners, most of whom were senior runners that were taking the SAT test. From there, it's conjecture, but common sense would seem to indicate, to cite one example, that Kaleena Yee's addition to the Rancho Bernardo girls roster would almost certainly have decreased their team time by 1:30 or more. It's not rocket science.

crown, with Yucaipa being the fastest team on the day.

In girls racing, Torrey Pines nipped West Hills in Division I and was the fastest team overall. and San Pasqual had the fastest group in Division II, by one second over Valley Center.

It doesn't take much of a tweak of the format to see that the most impressive teams on the day were Valley Center's boys and Torrey's

The Jaguars cranked it up late in the day, with their athletes taking first in the number four, number three, number two and number one races

VC's Gus Polito (16:22), Ryan Skerl (16:41) and Cooper Bachman (16:46) ended up with the three fastest times of the day on the 3.2mile course, and number four Jag Tony Illig (17:16) had the 20th fastest clocking in boys racing. Bachman had to finish strong to overtake Claremont's Ian McHenry to win the number twos race.

By more traditional measurements (see Deconstructing SoCal), Valley Center's boys could conceivably have won the entire meet.

Fallbrook coach Marty Hauck, who has an enyclopedic knowledge of comparative times at Guajome Park, was impressed.

"I knew their top three guys were good, but I didn't know their fourth was that good," Hauck said. "Not low 17s good."


Other good-looking boys teams were Yucaipa, Ramona, West Hills, Fallbrook and Sweetwater.



Boys team titles went to Brawley in Division III, to the Saints in Division IV, and to Bishop's in Division V.


Girls team titles were won by Brawley in Division III, by Coronado in Division IV, and by La Jolla Country Day in Division V.

The course did not race fast on the day.


The Saints are much stronger than they seemed in pre-season. Sean Barrett has strengthened the top, the emergence of Stender has bolstered the middle and the recovery of Pat Barrett from an injury that threatened his entire season, has brought up the back of the pack.

Timinsky rocketed around the rain-softened course in 18:42, which was 1:37 ahead of Mission Bay's Rose Serna, who ran 20:19.

effort considering her condition. She will be a factor in the CIF Division V race.


One of the pleasures of the St. Augustine Invite, besides seeing the small school runners get a chance to shine, is getting a sneak preview of the CIF races in the lower divisions.

All bets are off this year, however. Schools such as Calvin Christian and Army Navy Academy, both of which usually race here, were not in attendance. And the county's best Division IV school, Valley Center, was also missing.

If Valley Center is in Division III, they would be the favorite in the boys team race, with possible challenges from among the University of San Diego, La Jolla and University City. The Jaguars drop off after the number four spot, but the Division III field is probably not deep enough for that to matter much

The Valley Center girls team would be a strong contender to break into the top two, challenging University City, La Jolla and Brawley. The overwhelming individual favorite in that race would be San Dieguito's Timinsky.

Another possible wild card in either the Division V or IV races is Steele Canyon, a brand new school.

Steele Canyon has just a freshman class this year, and their actual attendance figures are to this point unknown, so they could end up in either of the lower two divisions. They are based in an area, drawing from Valhalla, Monte Vista and Granite Hills, that historically produces good runners.

To this point, they have just been running in Grossmont South dual meets, with their frosh teams sometimes racing against other varsities, and sometimes against other frosh squads. Their talent level is still very much unknown, but they could be a factor in the lower divisions.
