





All-time teams: Monte Vista's boys of 1966 -- 3-time champs

As local legends go, the Monte Vista boys cross country teams of the mid-1960s rank right at the

They had a great, young coach in Bob Larsen (now the head track coach at UCLA). They had a great group of talented, hard-working athletes. And they had a mystique that was born out of great success and a few quirks.

The 1966 edition was, on the record (and you can look it up), the most dominant team to ever compete in large schools CIF competition. They scored 19 points to win the county title that year, and this was at a time when the area was producing many of its best runners ever.

The 19 points secured the title by a ridiculous margin. Second place Point Loma scored 84. The field included talents such as Clairemont's Thornton Bigley (a 4:10 mile runner), and Kearny's Steve Becker (a 4:13 miler).

It was the third straight CIF title for Larsen and the team, the core of which was basically an intact unit throughout the streak.

The 1966 team featured seniors Don Olsen, Dave Matheny, Rodney Stephens and Danny Ungricht, and sophomore Dave Carter.

The four seniors were the heart of a team that won the CIF small schools title in 1964, when they were sophomores.

As juniors, they won the large schools crown in 1965, scoring 35 points.

As maturing seniors, and with Carter developing into a great young runner, they were unchallenged.

In most league meets, they rolled up 15-50 scores. In one meet, they ran as a unit, finished in a seven-way tie, and still broke a course record that was set by El Cajon's Armando Valencia.

They had a dual meet winning streak that stretched back to early season of 1964

The group's track feats tell some, but not all, of the story.

Olsen, the team leader and large schools cross country individual champ, was a 9:03.6 two-mile runner. He ran that in finishing second to Lincoln's Otis Martin in the 1967 CIF two-mile.

Soph Carter was third in that CIF two-mile, running 9:21.2.

Matheny was fourth in the same race, clocking 9:23.5.

In the same meet, Ungricht ran the 880 in 1:53.0 to win the CIF title. It was a magical night for the Monarchs.

The fifth member of the cross country team's scoring pack was Stephens, who had 4:25 track credentials.

The group ran one distance medley race, in early season, and broke the county record, clocking 10:23.4. Ungricht ran the 880, Carter ran the 1320 and Olsen anchored the mile leg.

In those days, Track & Field News used to sponsor a postal competition, to sort out the best distance running groups in the country.

To enter, five members of a team had to run a two-mile race on a track, record the times, and notify Track & Field News of the results. It was a popular way to gauge talent across the country.

The Monarchs ran their race at Mesa College after the cross country season was over, and ran a collective time that was sixth in the nation as a team.

The developer of the talent was Larsen, who was just starting out in coaching.

"When I first started running as a freshman, it was his (Larsen's) first year as a coach," Olsen remembered. "He looked so young, I thought he was the team captain. It was a while before I realized he was the coach."

Larsen and the Monte Vista runners developed quickly, each contributing to their collective reputation.

"He was able to motivate people," Olsen explained. "He spent a lot of time talking to us about how it should feel while you're racing."

"He was quiet and shy," Olsen said. "He had been a good runner, but he never really talked about it. He had everybody's respect."

And, the ultimate compliment for a mentor: "He made a difference in my life," Olsen said.

Of course, a lot of hard work was involved in the equation.

There was a 500-mile club in the summer. Runners reaching that total were rewarded with a training trip to Yosemite.

There was a pizza run at the end of summer. Any runner that could beat Larsen would earn a pizza. But, "We had two or three beat him that last year, but I never saw the pizza," Olsen said.

And there were the PTA workouts. Pain, tortue and agony.

Olsen remembers a run from the La Jolla shores to Del Mar and back, a workout that was more like a 10-mile race. "It got competitive," he said.

There were the 2-man, 10-mile relays, with a pair of runners alternating racing quarters against other teams, with each runner totaling 20 quarters. The rest period was the partner's quarter-

It all paid off.

"We had a reputation for running strong in the second half of a race," Olsen said.

The team developed a certain mystique. Many team members ran races in their bare feet. The

Matheny brothers were proponents of shoeless racing, and Olsen did it on occasion.

"Some of the kids lived in Jamul and went barefoot all the time," Olsen said. "They had very tough feet."

"Larsen was against it," Olsen said. "In cross country, you have to take care of your feet.'

But the style added to the team's reputation, with some believing that it was one of the team's "secrets."

The legacy:

Larsen soon went on to coach at Grossmont College, and won a string of state titles before moving to UCLA.

Olsen lives in Lakeside, where one of his sons, David, runs for El

Ungricht coached at Mission Bay High and won a state cross country title there. He has a nephew running at Fallbrook.





The finals schedule...

The season's final meets are literally just around the corner.

The schedule (race plans can still change, so check times and dates if planning to attend):

Monday, November 9: HARBOR LEAGUE:

At Morley Field, with teams running the dual meet courses (3.0 for boys, 2.5 for girls). Meet director is Gompers coach Mary Beving-Morning.

Boys will run at 3 p.m., and girls will race at 3:30.

Weight: Team standings determined by dual meets only.

The boys varsity race will feature Crawford's Simon Peters and Abdi Abdi; Coronado's Paul Whitford; Clairemont's Nelson Rivas and Christian's Jared Phillips.

The girls race will be among Coronado's Barbra Chakos and Samantha Piper; Clairemont's Jen Wirkus and Madison's Breanna Ducker.

Wednesday, November 11: EASTERN LEAGUE:

At Morley Field, with teams running the dual meet courses (3.0 for boys, 2.5 for girls). Varsity boys will race at 9 a.m.; followed by varsity girls at 9:30 and junior varsity boys at 10.

Weight: Counts 50/50 with dual meets to determine titles.

The boys team race will feature a rematch between San Diego and Point Loma, with Serra and Mira Mesa also factors. Point Loma's girls will be favored in the girls team race, with Mira Mesa and Morse also contending.

Serra's Marcus Chandler, one of the nation's best, is a big favorite for the individual title. Others that will be near the front are Kearny's Mohamed Aden, Point Loma's Tom Antl, San Diego's Alex Cocina and Mira Mesa's Thomas Jodoin.

A good girls field will include Morse's Amonica Phipps, Point Loma's Peeper Gilmore, Serra's Kjirsten Bevins, Mira Mesa's Dori McGuire, and San Diego's Roxanne Romo.

Thursday, November 12. WESTERN LEAGUE:

At Morley Field, with teams running dual meet courses (boys and girls both run 3.0 miles).

Junior varsity girls run at 2:30 p.m., followed by varsity girls at 3, varsity boys at 3:30, and junior varsity boys at 4.

Meet directors are La Jolla's Tom Dorman and Chuck Boyer.

Weight: 50/50, duals and finals, determine titles.

The girls team race will feature Division III contenders University City, and La Jolla, with Scripps Ranch hoping to be a factor.

The boys team race will be a

rematch of the dual between La Jolla and Scripps Ranch, with St. Augustine also contending.

The boys race will probably be among UC's Jon O'Connor, La Jolla's Alejandro Mares, and Scripps' Patrick Grimes and Raphael Machado.

The girls race could be among University of San Diego's Michelle Barrack, La Jolla's Desiree Leek and Liz Edwards and UC's Katherine Ziegler, Talisha Clophus and Carly Votolato.

Friday, November 13. METRO LEAGUE:

At Southwestern College, with teams running 3.1 miles (boys) and 2.47 miles (girls). Varsity boys start at 2 p.m., followed by varsity girls at 2:30, junior varsity boys at 3, and junior varsity girls at 3:30.

Meet director is Bonita Vista coach Ian Cumming.

Weight: 50/50, duals and finals, determine titles.

The boys team race will feature Sweetwater, Chula Vista and Bonita Vista.

The girls team race will feature a rematch of Bonita Vista and Chula Vista.

Top boys are Bonita Vista's Brian Paff and Ted Herbert, Sweetwater's Ruben Vences, Adrian Garcia and Paul Franco, Chula Vista's Michael Manzano and Ken Nwadike, Hilltop's Lorenzo Otero, Mar Vista's Blake Swier and Montgomery's Jose Simpson.

Hilltop's Desiree Davila has been the dominant Metro girl, but other quality runners include Bonita's Candice Osuna and Dawna Marshall, Castle Park's Ana Melvin, Chula's Mythili Duvvuri, and Montgomery's Angela Rivas.

COASTAL/SOUTHERN LEAGUES:

At Morley Field, with teams running the CIF course (3.1 miles for boys; 2.5 miles for girls).

Race times are junior varsity boys at 2:30 p.m., varsity girls at 3:15, and varsity boys at 4.

Meet director is Francis Parker coach John Lown.

The newly-split leagues will run simultaneously, with the final results separated after the fact.

Weight: Unclear, although the finals will play a role in team titles.

The Coastal boys team race will see Calvin Christian heavily favored, with Army Navy and Bishop's as contenders. San Dieguito Academy is a favorite in the Coastal girls team race, with Calvin Christian, Bishop's, La Jolla CD and Francis Parker all in the mix.

The Southern boys team race favorite is Holtville, with Julian and Lutheran in contention. The Southern girls race will be among Holtville and Lutheran, although Julian and Mountain Empire could be in it if they field full teams.

Top runners in the boys race, including both leagues, are Calvin's Bart Conner, Chad Young and Jon Beutlich; Army Navy's Will Kraemer and Andrew Francis; Bishop's Peter Holland; La Jolla CD's Jared Ziman; Vincent Memorial's Darren Wisdom; and Julian's Sean McCarty.

Francis Parker's Angela Petersen is one of the best in the state, and will be a strong favorite, but there is a surprisingly strong field behind her (in both leagues) including San Dieguito's Jenna Timinsky and Jessica Bray, Bishop's Kaili Shumilak, La Jolla CD's Carly Gardner and Daniella Scarfeo, Mountain Empire's Lily Dowlatshahie and Courtney Watkins, Julian's Erin Calloway and Arielle Damron, Calvin's Marjorie Spurr, and Holtville's Liz Robinson.

Saturday, November 14. NORTH COUNTY:

At Guajome Park, with boys running 3.2 miles and girls running 2.6 miles.

The schedule: Avocado girls at 9 a.m., followed by Valley girls at 9:30, and Palomar girls at 10.

The Avocado boys race at 10:30, followed by Valley boys at 11, and the Palomar boys at 11:30.

Weight: 50/50, duals and finals, to determine team titles.

Avocado boys team race will see Fallbrook heavily favored. The girls team race will be among Torey Pines, Fallbrook and Carlsbad.

Best Avocado boys are Fallbrook's Efrain Casarez, Jose Escobedo and Bill Ungricht.

Top Avo girls are Torrey's Camille Dredge, Julie Komosinski, Kathy Read and Jackie Appel, Fallbrook's Cathy Picha, Kim Croswell, Jamie Carmichael and Maija Rohde, Carlsbad's Katie O'Connell, Cindy Lopresti and Kelly Platko, La Costa Canyon's Julia Cormano, and El Camino's Sabrina St. Laurent.

The Palomar boys team race features a strong Vista team and quality teams from Poway, Mt. Carmel, San Marcos and Rancho Buena Vista.

A quality boys individual race is on tap, with RB's Sean Ricketts, Vista's Justin Neuroth, Ryan Montez, Jared Emmons and Sean Daley, San Marcos' Travis Laird, Andrew Boring and Laurence Mier, Mt. Carmel's Alan Aradanas and Mike Cooke, RBV's Nick Thornton, and Poway's Josh Pope, Devin Lyons-Quirk, Aaron Powell, Pat Prunty and Luke McGinnis all in the mix.

The Palomar girls team race features a great Rancho Bernardo squad, and very, very good teams from Mt. Carmel and Poway. Rancho Buena Vista and Vista are also very decent.

Top Palomar girls include RB's Julie Manson, Allison Hall, Kaleena Yee, Katie Boyd, Sarah Wilkins and Kerri Wheeler, Mt. Carmel's Amy Vasko, Ashley Dere, Janet Mulvey and Manal Yamount, RBV's Natassja Hall and

Courtney Allen, San Marcos' Nicole Mier, Vista's Tiffany Lee, and Poway's Megan Briscoe, Brianna Hibbs, Kamaya Damwijk and Amber Smith.

San Pasqual's boys will be favored in the Valley team race, with Escondido and Orange Glen in contention.

Ramona's Matt McInvale will be heavily favored, but look for good efforts from San Pasqual's Adam Van Wart and Erik Kerby, OG's Nick Jones and Nick Schlapfer and Escondido's Juan Mondragon and Enrique Montoya.

The Valley girls could be a wide-open race among Ramona, Valley Center, Orange Glen and Escondido.

Runners to watch are OG's Lorena Jimenez, VC's Diana Dibble, Escondido's Lanele Cox and Ramona's Loretta Kilmer.

GROSSMONT LEAGUES:

At La Mesa's Harry Griffen Park, with boys running 3.1 miles, and girls running 2.3 miles.

The Grossmont North and Grossmont South runners will run together, with league results to be separated later. Meet director is Helix coach Dave Schultz.

Junior varsity girls race at 8:30 a.m., followed by junior varsity boys at 9, varsity girls at 9:30 and varsity boys at 10.

Weight: 2/3 finals, 1/3 duals to determine team titles, usually eliminating ties in case of a split.

Grossmont South boys team race will be a rematch of the Valhalla and Granite Hills teams; and the girls team race will feature Valhalla and Helix.

Grossmont North teams to watch are West Hills and El Capitan in both boys and girls.

The individual boys race (combined) could be great. Granite Hills' Jason Finch, West Hills' Evan Fox and Monte Vista's Jon Rankin are among the best in the state. Other quality talents include Helix' Dan Kinsella, Granite's Ian Bartonicek, West Hills' Ben Aragon, Paul Saccone and Matt Rendina, Valhalla's Ben Wagner, Tyler Ludwig, David Santos and Matt Theisen, El Capitan's Bryan Hillberg and David Olsen, and Grossmont's Nick Redman.

The individual girls race (combined) is also among a strong field. Helix' Courtney Baird is the favorite. Other top runners are West Hills' Heather Shurtleff and Becca Bartell, Santana's Kim Pace, El Cap's Jasmine Marquez, and Valhalla's Laura Trask, Lesley Bravin, Kristi Pinnell, and Elaine Lassen.



DUALS:

The action to date...

Dual meets are, in most leagues, just one step in the process of deciding team titles.

Most of the area's leagues use a combination of dual meet results and the results of the finals to determine the team champion.

The exception is the Harbor League, which determines the title only on dual results.

With the last week of dual meets being completed this week, **TRACK MAGAZINE** surveys where things stand at the moment. Some important duals will be conducted after press time, but before you read this issue.

League by league, in alphabetical order:

AVOCADO: Final meet pits three unbeaten girls teams

Everything was still up in the air for the Avocado League girls at press time, but the Fallbrook boys have encountered light opposition to date.

Torrey Pines and Carlsbad visit Fallbrook in a double dual on Friday, which will help decide the dual-meet portion of the Avo girls title. All three teams are unbeaten in league action.

Torrey, second-ranked in the county, actually has a loss to their credit. La Costa Canyon's girls beat the Torrey second team, 28-29, on a date that the varsity was traveling to the Stanford Invite. This means that for Torrey to win the Avo title, they have to defeat Fallbrook in both the dual meet and in the league meet. Fallbrook can win the title with a split.

The Carlsbad girls, with little notice, have a quality team that is ranked 9th in the county, and they should not be overlooked.

There has been little opposition for the Fallbrook boys in league meets to date, which is a combination of Fallbrook having a strong team, and the other league members having down years.

COASTAL: Calvin boys unbeaten; San Dieguito leads girls standings

The dual meets to date have done two things.

First, they have established the

Calvin Christian boys as a dominant force.

And second, they have not clarified which of the league's Division V teams might be a CIF title contender, although San Dieguito Academy's girls (a D-IV team) are unbeaten to date.

The Calvin boys are cruising. The most competitive meet was a 19-44 win on October 1 over Army Navy. ANA is the league's second best team, with wins over Francis Parker and Bishop's, but was not at full strength when they raced Calvin.

San Dieguito's girls have not lost, and they have wins over all the other major contenders.

The Parker, Country Day and Calvin girls still have some double-dual business to settle this week, but no clear-cut CIF title contender has yet emerged from the loop's Division V schools.

Calvin's girls have beaten Bishop's; Bishop's has tied Parker (neither team had a sixth-runner that day to settle the tie); and Bishop's beat LJCD by one point. Country Day has one-point losses to San Dieguito and Bishop's.

EASTERN: Point Loma girls, San Diego boys on top

At season's start, San Diego's boys were not thought to be in the title mix. But the Cavers are unbeaten, and have beaten their most serious rival, Point Loma, in a close race on October 14. The Pointers are well established in second place going into the final week, with wins over Mira Mesa, Patrick Henry and Serra. The Cavers still have to deal with a Serra team that has great upfront talent.

There have been some eyeopening times on the new Morley 3.0-mile course. Serra's Marcus Chandler has run a 15:12, and Kearny's Mohamed Aden has clocked a 15:35. Point Loma's Tom Antl (15:52) and San Diego's Alex Cocina (15:57) have also dipped under 16 minutes.

The Point Loma girls are unbeaten and have faced all of the serious contenders. Their closest meet was with Morse, which was a 23-32 win. Mira Mesa's girls are in second in the standings going into the last week, with Morse in third.

GROSSMONT NORTH: West Hills, El Cap teams unbeaten

It's been all West Hills and El Capitan up to this point in the Grossmont North. The teams will meet in the season's final meet.

The top-ranked Wolfpack boys have scored 15 points in each of their three duals, and they will be a big favorite when they meet the Vaqueros.

The West Hills girls have been also cruising along, but the El Cap girls have been keeping pace. The Pack will be favored in the dual, but El Cap will be competitive, especially at the top of the roster.

Grossmont and Santana will settle third place in their boys and girls duals this week.

GROSSMONT SOUTH: Granite boys, Valhalla girls unbeaten

It's almost been a one-meet season for the Grossmont South boys teams.



Long Beach Poly won the race in impressive fashion, totaling a 78:48 team time, which is a performance that ranks among the best ever in this race with the rich history.

West Hills' top five runners totaled 79:58, which averages out to less than 16 minutes for each runner on the storied course of three miles of dusty hills. Less than 30 teams in the history of the meet have dipped below 80 minutes in team time.

The Wolfpack came out of the meet with a well-deserved number two rank in the state.

Junior Evan Fox led the effort, with a 15:23 in the race, good for second in the field.

Other Wolfpack scorers were soph Ben Aragon (15:55), and seniors Paul Saccone (16:04), Matt Rendina (16:11) and Tim Rodman

It was a level jump for a team that was already excellent. Poway coach Dan Schaitel said, "It was the best I've seen a San Diego team run there."

"It was a breakthrough," West Hills girls coach Bill Cleves observed.

We got out right from the start," West Hills boys coach Pat Connolly said. "After the first mile, our guys were all in the top twenty. I thought, 'Great. I just hope they can hang on a little bit."

There were other signifcant efforts by San Diego Section runners.

Serra's Marcus Chandler won the individual sweeps race in 15:09, which was the second fastest time of the meet.

It was the latest in a series of fine efforts by the Serra senior, who has established himself as one of the very best runners in the
