

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The 1999 Team Previews...

The **Track Magazine** team previews are the results of weeks of labor, contacting coaches via phone and in person. Often, it takes a number of phone calls and encounters with answering machines before an interview is completed. It's the rare case when a coach is contacted on the first call.

A number of coaches are tough to reach, and a few of the teams will have to wait until next issue or later for their recognition. One or two teams had just named a new coach, in fact.

In retrospect, it's almost a miracle that any names are spelled correctly -- most of the spellings are either taken over the telephone or gleaned from finish tags that are hastily scribbled and often blurred by sweat. If a spelling or other important information is incorrect, we will strive to get it corrected in future issues.

The information is gathered over a period of weeks, which means that the first coaches were contacted in early September.

There can often be big changes on a team in a few weeks. Unknown runners can make themselves known, and established runners can get hurt.



The Teams: Mt. Carmel


Division: One. Coach: Dennis McClanahan, assisted by Nathan Boyer and John Rankin. Home Course: Starts and finishes on campus.

BOYS: Numbers: 33. Leader: Chris Kenyon (12). He's a 9:46 3200 runner in track. At his best, he's the team's best. There's a hard-charging quality pack right on his heels. The pack: Mike Cooke (12), Sergio Esquivel (12), Mike Klepper (12), Ben Bruce (12), Alan Aradanas (10), Mike Zahalan (12) all were members of the team that finished a close third in the CIF D-I race last year. Cooke can range up into the number one role, and Aradanas is arguably the best soph runner around. His winning time in the soph race at Sundevil was the fastest of the day for Mt. Carmel athletes. New: Abadir Barre (10), John Bentley (11), Greg Williams (9), Alex Fromer (11). Barre has upped his level dramatically since last year; Bentley is new to the sport. Williams is a good looking youngster who was third in the Sundevil frosh race last week. One or two of this group could challenge for a varsity role before the

Outlook: They were one of the best county teams last year, and their lineup returns intact. In fact, some of the younger runners could even upgrade the lineup. This isn't an average year in the section, however. There are three extremely tough teams in the Palomar and four externely tough teams in CIF D-I. Mt. Carmel is, of course, one of those extremely tough teams. One edge they might have is their depth down to the ninth or tenth runner, although that may or may not come into play.

Numbers: 20. Leaders: Janet Mulvey (11), Deanna Sick (10), Karen Vasko (12). Mulvey has been the best in early races, but the other two are also top quality runners. Sick is new to the sport after running 5:18 and 11:19 in track. Vasko has 5:24 and 11:31 ability. Mulvey's track times (5:28 for 1600) aren't bad, but she is much better at this sport. The pack: Ashlee Dere (11), Manal Yamout (11), Audrey Harrer (11), Kim Nessell (11). They all return from last year's CIF champions. In the 3200, Dere ran 11:46, Yamout ran 11:40 and Harrer clocked 12:13. New: Sick is a great addition. "It means we are one person deeper," McClanahan said. There is good depth, with Amy Vasko (10), Sara Dadkhah (11), Gabby Sanchez (11), and Danella Fromer (9) ready to move up if needed. Vasko is a 12:17 3200 runner; Dadkhah ran 19:45 for 3.0 at Dana Hills last year, then missed the rest of the season.

Outlook: Off early results, they should be as good as last year, when they were fifth in the state. The addition of Sick upgrades the talent level. There might be some ups and downs, but they seem to be right there with Rancho Bernardo as the two best teams in the county.

Poway

Division: One. Coach: Dan Schaitel, assisted by Mark Embrey, Dean Cortez and Charlene Falcis. Home Course:

BOYS:

Numbers: 38. Leaders: Josh Pope (12) is just out in front of a speedy, hard-charging pack of six that also includes Devin Lyons-Quirk (11), Aaron Powell (11), Pat Prunty (12), Tim Helms (12) and Luke McGinnis (10). So why are all these runners included as "leaders" and not "the pack?" It's the quality - any of the six would be number one runners at many area schools. At the Bronco, for instance, the Titans' sixth man placed ahead of the number one runner from such teams as Mt. Carmel, San Pasqual and Valhalla. They all have good credentials on the track, too: Pope (1:58, 4:22), Lyons-Quirk (4:29, 9:50), Powell (1:56), Prunty (1:59, 4:30), Helms (10:00), and McGinnis (9:56). The pack: Schaitel notes that there is a gap between six and seven, which means that the top group needs to stay healthy. A number of candidates have a chance to make up the ground, including Jeff Lucas (12),

Kevin Swain (12), Chris Ryan (11), and James McCarthy (11).

Outlook: "We're as solid as anybody to six," Schaitel said. This is one of the best collections of talent that Poway has put together, and that's saying something. The school's tradition includes a number of CIF titles, and this team could hang a banner in the rafters. This is an extremely strong year in the section for great boys teams in D-I, however. Probably no team in the county has better athletes at the four-five-six spots, which are often key in the championship meets.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 37. Leader: Katie. Baker (12). She's been a real find this fall. She's a speedster (61, 2:27) making her first serious try at the sport, with good results. She won her race at the Norseman meet, which was the season opener. The pack: Danielle Holden (11), Melanie Monroe (9), Aubrey Boag (9). Schaitel is rebuilding this lineup. He winnowed the roster, cutting some of the multisport athletes and found that, "the attitude is 100% better." New: Virtually the entire varsity lineup. Baker, as mentioned, was a middledistance runner. Holden arrived last year from Camarillo. The frosh, Monroe and Boag, look like they'll contribute right away. Others with a shot at making the top seven are Angela Mares (12), Audrey Pound (11), Britt Jennings (12), Sarah Spooner (10), Jenny Spooner (10), Jessica Schenk (9), Tara Witty (11), and Allyce Ozarski (11). Many of those candidates have good track credentials, so the raw material is on hand.

Outlook: "This is probably the best coaching challenge I've had in 30 years," Schaitel said. "The boys team is a known quantity, and the girls team needs to be developed. I think they (the girls) will be competitive." Conditions are right for this team to be pretty decent. They won't be able to challenge the league's best teams, but they should be able to hang with any of the others.

Rancho Bernardo

Divison: One. Coach: Don Jones, assisted by Terry Dockery. Home course: Rancho Bernardo Community Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. Leader: Sean Ricketts (12). He's been the guy since late in his freshman year, when he was one of the top frosh in the state. He has 1:53, 4:18 track credentials, so he's top quality there, too. Simply, one of the very best in the county, and has been for a while. The pack: This area of the team seems improved.

The lineup includes Mike Shannon (12), Jake Fulton (12), Cameron Sanders (11), Mike Albo (10), Ryan Crim (12), Andy Campbell (12) and Dan Tanks (10). Most are veterans from last year's varsity, which came on strong late in the year. New: Albo and Crim are new to the varsity, but both have been in the program.

Outlook: Few noticed, but the RB boys actually ended up the year ranked 15th in the county, which is just under the local radar. Virtually the entire team returns, which means they should be better this year. Again, many won't notice because the Palomar is so tough.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 27. Leaders: Julie Manson (12), Allison Hall (10), Kaleena Yee (11). Manson, 14th in the state last year, is wrapping up a fine four-year career, and Hall, 16th in the state, is just on the second leg of hers. Both are a few steps ahead of Yee, who would be number one at

many, many schools. In track, Manson runs 5:13 and 11:05; Hall runs 2:19 and 5:05. Both made it to the state track championships last year. Yee runs 5:13. The pack: Jamie Doyle (10), Katie Boyd (11), Mikaelyn Austin (12), Kerri Wheeler (11), Lisa Lyons (12), Belinda Oberum (10), Kelly Larson (11). Doyle is actually not that far behind the top three. Some of the others have state meet experience. Boyd (11:52), Larson (2:26), Lyons and Austin (many events) are fine track athletes. New: Doyle is probably the key addition. She didn't run XC as a frosh and battled injuries in track, but she has fit right into the four slot in early meets. There's a decent group of frosh, including Sarah Lochmiller, Jessica Huepper, Melodie Tao and Whitney Kuptz, but the lineup will be tough to crack.

Outlook: Jones says he can run a strong varsity, a strong junior varsity and a strong frosh/soph group down to ten runners. The depth is there, and the talent at the top is there. What the team really could use is a little bit of good fortune. They were third in CIF D-I last year, and the two teams that beat them out for Fresno tickets both finished among the state's top five. There was no doubt that RB also belonged in that group. They could be as good or better this year.

Rancho Buena Vista


Division: One. Coach: Tom Lux, assisted by Denaryle Williams. Home course: Buena Vista Park, adjacent to campus.

BOYS:


Numbers: 20. Leader: Nick Thornton (12). He hasn't been great in cross country up to now, but his breakthrough last year in track (1:54 for 800) shows that he has elevated his level. It could also translate into big improvement in this sport. The pack: Aaron Trunnell (11), Shaun Ferris (10). Both return from last year's varsity; Trunnell, after a "big summer," seems sharply improved. New: "We're really young," Lux said. "Our 4-5-6-7 will be frosh and sophs." However, the youngsters are talented. A group of ten freshman boys includes a core that set a middle-school team record at Mt. SAC last year. Lux said, "they are the best frosh group I've had." Keep an eye on Artemio Mateo (9), Troy McAdams (9), Jason Miller (9), Matt Mena (9), and Jose De Leon (10). Lux will run them in grade-level races as often as possible, but many of the youngsters will be on the varsity squad for the tough Palomar duals.

Outlook: Thornton has a chance to be much improved, but the team is a bit thin in the mid-pack until the youngsters develop. It won't be a bad team, but the league is very tough.

GIRLS: Numbers: 11. Leader: Nastassaja Hall (10). She has great range as a runner. In track, she is one of the county's very best sprinters (second in the Masters 200), but she runs very well up to 5K, where she was 38th in the state D-I race, running 19:19 as a frosh. She seems ready to pick up where she left off. The pack: Courtney Allen (10), Angela Garcia (11), Jessica Murray (11). Allen was also an excellent frosh last year; Garcia and Murray finished the year as varsity scorers. New: Tiffany Myres (10), Jordanna Koch (9), Jacqueline Murray (9). They have the best chance to crack the lineup, off

early results. Aroline Neal (11), one of the county's best sprinters, is recovering from knee surgery, and is giving the sport a try. Lux will make sure she stays away from hilly courses.


Outlook: Hall is quality, and the top end of the pack isn't bad, but there is very little depth. They'll be better than the Palomar results make them look.

San Marcos

Division: One. Coach: Kyle Billings, assisted by Ken Franklin and Jose Fernandez. Home course: Cal State, San Marcos.

BOYS:

Numbers: 15. Leader: Travis Laird (12). One of the very best in the county, he might be a little underrated. He was 12th in CIF D-1, after finishing seventh in the league finals. He then went on to break through in track, running 9:18 for fourth in the Masters 3200. "He made a jump," Billings said. "I think he's making another jump this season." In his season opener, he ripped a 15:26 for three miles at Laguna Hills, the he gave Matt Mc-Invale a good run at Sundevil. He has

moved into the Fox/Ricketts/Neuroth class. The pack: Needs to be rebuilt. Two veterans are Isaac Chitica (11) and Chris Harris (11). New: David Ignacio (10), Jimmy Retherford (10). Both in their first year of cross country, they ran 16:42 and 17:09 at Laguna Hills. Ignacio might be the team's number two, just ahead of Harris. Other candidates are Austin Bissonnette (9) and Jake Krotje (10).

Outlook: Laird will be great, but the rest of the team needs time to develop. "We're kind of young, but there's some potential there," Billings said. "We're not real deep after five." It will be fun watching Laird match up with anybody in the county. If the young runners develop, this will be a decent team.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 15. Leader: Nicole Mier (10). Her frosh year started in promising fashion, but she didn't finish the CIF Finals D-I race. The snapped back in track, and was 4th in the Masters 1600 in 5:10. That puts her at a level just behind the county's best, and not that far back, either. Her effort at Sundevil was amazing. The pack: Juliana Hernandez (10), new to running, is the team's number two already, after clocking 19:40 at Laguna Hills. Behind here are Michelle Retherford (9), Krista Serina (9), Sylvia Mendoza (9), Jacquie And-

erson (11), Petra Freudenthaler (11) and Amanda Cook (12). Freudenthaler is an exchange student from Austria. New: Virtually the entire roster is new, other than Mier at the top.

Outlook: "The girls will be improved," Billings said. He has a good one-two soph punch at the top. If his other youngsters come on, this could be a competitive team.

Vista

Division: One. Coach: Pete Brooks, head; Cindy Brooks, girls. Home course: Guajome Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 50. Leader: Justin Neuroth (12). He's right there with the best in the county. He was third in last year's CIF D-I race. In track, he was second in the Masters 1600 in 4:15, and he made the state final. He's beginning the year in better shape than anybody this side of Ramona. Right behind: The Panthers could have the best two-three punch in the county, with Ryan Montez (11) and Jared Emmons (12). The two can switch back and forth, although Montez is ahead at this point of the season. Emmons made a breakthrough in track, running 1:54. Montez is more of a 3200 runner (9:43). Vista and Poway have already been matched up twice. In one meet, the Panthers had three ahead of Poway's number one. In another meet, Poway's leader just edged Vista's three. The pack: A big key. With their strength up front, Vista's pack doesn't have to match up with Poway, but they do have to stay close. The lineup includes Mark Baddas (11), Joe Aguilar (10) and Ramon German (11). Baddas and Aguilar are returning vets who are working hard and maturing. German is new to this level, but is handling it. The seventh could come from Irving Franklin (12), Leo Blasius (12) or maybe Miguel Villareal (9). New: Not much - much of this team has been in place for several seasons.

Outlook: Much like Poway, Vista is one of the very best teams in the state. Like the Titans, the Panthers have put together one of the best groups of runners in the school's history. If the 4-5-6 runners can continue their improvement, this team will be extremely tough to beat. But even that kind of excellence doesn't guarantee much, such is the strength at the top of the county.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 26. Leader: Tiffany Lee (11). She's quality. She was 11th in the league last year as a soph. Nine of the ten girls ahead of her also return, however. The pack: Erica Lopez (10), Michelle Miller (9), and Rebecca Swilley (9) could make up the top group. After that, look for Silvia Rivas (12), Olympia Olquin (10), Maria Mendoza (12), Kim Vinzant (11), and Jessica Kelleher (10). All but Kelleher and the frosh are returning varsity vets. New: Kelleher is new to running but shows promise; frosh Miller and Swilley are pushing towards the top of the pack.

Outlook: It's a young team, but there is also talent and experience. They will probably match up well with the middle teams of the league, which means that they are better than most

teams in the county.

Division: One. Coach: Keith Van Asdalan. Home course: Hosp Woods, more formally known as Hospital Grove Park, near Plaza Camino Real.

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. Leaders:
Early on, it was a tossup between
Joey Sheffer (12) and David
Schertzer (12). The pack: Chris
Burnham (11), Ben Miedema (11),
Stephen Daniels (12), Greg Horn (11)
and Brandon Woodward (12) all
return from last year's varsity.
Burnham has been well up in early
races. Daniels is a 400/800 runners
in track. Van Asdalan thinks his team
had a "pretty good summer."

Outlook: This could be a team worth watching. They were average last year, partly because they were very young. But the team returns virtually intact, and they seem to have bought into the hard work. They may not be ready to challenge Fallbrook yet, but they should be more than competitive with the rest of the league.




Outlook: It's still a very small team, but there is a very nice young core of talent, probably enough to give the team respectability in this league of high-powered girls teams.

league.







She's been CIF D-II champ two years in a row, and has track bests of 4:59 and 2:14. She's also quick enough to run sub-60 on the school's relay team. There have been some great achievements and relatively mild disappointments in her career, but everything seems to be on track at this point. The pack: They'll be key to the team success. Lupe Lopez (10) has returned in great shape, and Abril Jimenez (12) has good talent. In track she ran the 300 hurdles in 47.28, and the 800 in 2:27. Lara Wells (110 and Elizabeth Kolata (12) are returning varsity runners. New: Cynthia Roman (10) could help.

Outlook: The team is in transition as the new coaching staff takes over for Chip Holmes. One item that fell through the cracks was the off-season program. One coach estimates that it will take most of the season before the team is fit. One exception is Davila, who is already running well. The probable best-case scenario has the team in contention in the league next

season.

Mar Vista

Division: Three, moving down from Two. Coaches: Ben Holt, boys; Jim Coates, girls. Home course: Lucky Waller Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 20 or 21. The leader: Blake Swier. He tried running for the first time last year, and looked like he belonged. He was the team ace in cross country, and later ran a 4:27 for 1600 in track. One of the best in the league. The pack: Virtually the entire team returns, including Franky Ortega (12), Pedro Rivas (11), Jesus Perez (10), and Adan Sanchez (12). New: Ivan Gutierrez (12), ran on the varstiy at Mira Mesa last year, and might be the teams's number two man. Also looking to claim varsity spots are John Borja (11), Salvador Cota (11), Christian Flores (10), and Jose Sanchez (10).

Outlook: Holt has a strong group, with a good number one, and a pack that's putting in some hard work. They should be a contender in the Metro, and they will be one of the prime contenders in the wide open CIF D-III race this year. In fact, division rival Mission Bay and the Mariners are already keeping close tabs on each other.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 9, still adding. The pack: Amy Forrest (11), Christy Martin (11), Miranda Quick (11), Jessica Robles (9), Rebecca Valdez (9), Kristin McMasters (9), Analicia

The pack: Raul Garcia (11), Cliff Barnes (11), Daniel Porter (10), Jorge Sandoval. Garcia was in the middle of the varsity pack last year. Sandoval is another veteran. Barnes and Porter are new to the sport but show promise. The team also has a number of soccer players that might help.

Outlook: They're probably too thin to compete with the best league teams, but they are decent, especially in the front of the pack. Ledesma is hoping one or more of his pack will break through.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 20. The leader: Angela Rivas (12). She's quality; only two faster Metro girls return from last year's league meet. "She's been working real hard," Ledesma said. "I'm hoping this year will be a breakthrough." She ran the Baron meet 0:28 seconds faster than last year, so she could be on the way. The pack: Lyra Ponce (11), Alma Victorio (12), Jessica Lopez (11) all return from last year's varsity. Ponce is probably the two, Victorio is much improved. New: Joanna Barnes (9), Yenissa Kaeg (9), Tabitha Coffey (10) all seem like they'll help right away. Barnes is already challenging for the third spot.

Outlook: "We should do well as a team," Ledesma said. The third spot in the league seems up for grabs, but Chula and Bonita are probably out of reach. Rivas will benefit from the move down to D-II, where she'll have a good chance at qualifying for the state meet.

Southwest

Division: One. Coach: Jesus Rodriguez. Home course: Lucky Waller Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 12, could increase up to 22. The pack: Roberto Tiscarano (10), Max Cruz (12), Antonio Martinez (12), Juan Escobar (10). Martinez, also a soccer player, returns from last year's team. Tiscarano ran distance for the track team as a frosh. Cruz has also shown some talent.

Outlook: The school is soccer mad, and Rodriguez is trying to tap into some of that talent and interest. The strategy is to get many of the soccer players to run for conditioning, and developing the ones that get hooked on running.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 6, could add a few more. The leaders: Probably will be Karla de los Santos, who transferred from Kearny, where she was their best runner. The pack: Glenda Tiscarano (11), Lisa Moore (10), Meosha Jeffer-son (10). Moore and Jefferson are track sprinters doing some off season conditioning. Sometimes, those types can be effective.

Outlook: They didn't really have a girls team last year, so the situation is already improved. De los Santos should be fine, and some of the others may develop.

Sweetwater

Division: One. Coaches: Tim Latham, boys; Joe Lara, girls. Home course: Rohr Park.

BOYS:

Numbers: 25. The leader: Ruben Vences (12). He's the third fastest returner from last year's Metro finals, and he has been a solid cross country runner for the Devils throughout his career. The pack: Mark Dionela (11), Luis Reyna (12), Jovany Sotelo (12), all return from last year's varsity. Dionela, a solid two or three, is a 4:41 1600 runner. New: Abdirizak Abdi (11), transferred from Crawford, where he was a good number two runner for the Harbor League champs. Also jockeying for the varsity spots are Rudy Gonzales (12), Raul Gallarzo (11), Eddie Sanchez (10), Jesus Reyna (10) and Jose Guardado (10). Abdi could rise to the three spot.

Outlook: "We have a fairly solid first three," Latham said. This is a team that has been just a runner away for a few years. There seems to be more depth this year, and the intersquad competition should ensure that the four-five spots are solid. It could be a wide open year in the Metro, and Sweetwater is one of the the prime contenders.

GIRLS:



GIRLS: Numbers: 9, still adding. The leader: Merlynn Diaz (12). She's been the team's best virtually her entire career. She ran 21:24 in last year's league meet. The pack: Elizabeth Cortez (12), Jessica Hogue (11). Both return from last year's team. New: Fessehai is aggressively looking for prospects, and he has a pair of freshman from Kenya that he thinks might have talent.

Outlook: Fessehai might have a knack for finding the talent at Hoover, which would mean improvement for this program.

La Jolla

Division: Two; moving up from Three. Coaches: Chuck Boyer, boys; Tom Dorman, girls. Dorman is assisted by Mari Beth Brown and Michelle O'Connor.

BOYS:

Numbers: 40. The leaders: Chris Ferrier (11), Brandon Behr (12). Behr ran low 4:30s for 1600 as a soph, was injured much of last year. If he gets back to form, he could be the guy. Ferrier, a promising junior, is the best now. He ran 4:39 as a soph last spring. The pack: Eric Koster (12), Jonathan Dunbar (12), Larry Koster (12), Nate Lopez (12), Andrew Hoeksema (12). All are veterans of last year's varsity pack. As usual, the pack is the heart and

soul of La Jolla teams. New: Having a chance to break into the varsity are Scott Davis (11), Ryan Ablewitz (10), and Warren Binder (10).

Outlook: The elements are in place for a classic Viking team. The pack has talent and depth and is fueled by a strong work ethic. If one of the top runners breaks through a bit, the team is just that much stronger. Look for the team to contend strongly in the West and for a state meet slot in Division II.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 40. The leader: Desiree Leek (11). She missed most of the track season with an injury, but still ran 5:21. Has been the leader of the team since arriving as a frosh. The pack: Liz Edwards (10), Katie Grim (11), Tara McGowan (12), Maggie Sass (11), Michelle Guerrero (11), Leslie Borenstein (11). It's a strong veteran group. New: Sass is new to the varsity level. Dorman thinks a few of the frosh crop may develop as the season progresses, but the varsity group won't be easy to crack.

Outlook: The team is in a position to challenge UC in the West and for the D-II CIF title. The move up in division shouldn't hurt the Vikes. They finished last year solidly in the Top Ten, and all but one of the schools ranked ahead of them were D-I. They return their top five CIF scorers; the beat goes on.

Mission Bay

Division: Three. Coach: George Velarde.

BOYS:

Numbers: About 18. The leaders: Eric Richey (12), Eric Roye (12), Miguel Elias (12). The three senior returners have been training well and have focused on the CIF D-III title as a goal. All are returning varsity vets who went on to run well during track season. Velarde reports that they've got the team fired up. The pack: Matt Reeder (11), Jose Deloera (10), Robert Thatcher (10). This group could an important key. New: Deloera and Thatcher are both new to cross country.

Outlook: The Bucs have an opportunity in D-III this year, and seem intent on making the most of it. The seniors at the front could inspire their mates. "They (the front three) want to go to state as a team," Velarde said. It could happen.

GIRLS:

Numbers: 10. The leader: Rose Serna (10). She ran third in CIF D-III last year, and will probably be the favorite this year. In track, she clocked a 5:24 for 1600. The pack: Velarde will have to rebuild this part of the team. Christy Zaragoza (11) ran 5:45 in track and had a good summer of training. Elizabeth Vail (9) is also promising; and Danielle Richey (9), sister of Eric, is "really dedicated and a hard worker," Velarde reports. New: The three pack members mentioned above are all new, as is most of the team other than Serna.

Outlook: If the pack can develop enough, the Bucs have an outside chance to contend in CIF D-III. Serna looks like she'll be a real force in that race. She should also place well up in the league finals (against mostly D-II opposition).

Division: Three. Coach: Dan Keays, assissted by Jeff Mezzochi. GIRLS:

Numbers: 21. The leader: Claire Beck (12). She has been the established team leader since early in her career. She is the second fastest returning runner in the CIF D-III race. In track, she ran 5:26 and 12:00.

Outlook: "We're excited this year," Keays reported. "I think it's the best team I've ever had at OLP. We're strong through the top seven." With the CIF D-III race now officially wide open, OLP might be the team to step into the spotlight.

Division: Four. Coach: Jerry Downey.

BOYS:

Numbers: 35. The leader: Ryan Moorcroft (12). He was a revelation last spring, when he tried running for the first time. The results included a 4:21 for 1600. So far, he's adapted well to cross country, with wins in his first three invitationals. Downey has another nugget. The pack: Matt Herriman (12), Drew Bouchard (11), Pat Barrett (11), Jon Gardner (12), Sean Barrett (9). The first four are all varsity vets; Sean Barrett is Pat's little brother. In early meets, Bouchard has been the best of this group, but they've all shown well. Herriman is a 4:38 track runner. It's a strong group. New: Sean Barrett, of course. The next wave will include Ricky McRosky (10), John Israel (11), John Yunker (10) and Roberto Bravo (10).

Outlook: The Saints have a strong team. They could be a solid Top Ten team. More to the point, they will be more than competitive in the league, and they'll be a strong favorite in the CIF D-IV race. If the team continues to develop, they could end up with a nice ranking at the state level as well. They finished 9th in D-IV last year, but are much stronger now.



Division: Two. Coach: Bob Oliver.


BOYS:

Soares de Carvahlo is the niece of aBrazilian world-class runner, and has already been competing for years. Depth will be provided by Karissa Teitsch (10), Carolynn Crews (10), Lauren Severs (11) and Mhairi Whitton (11), all of whom were on the fringes of the varsity last year

Outlook: This could be a fun year. The emergence of Adsit-Morris, and Ziegler's hard-working attitude makes the front of the pack stronger. The depth is also excellent. If one or two of the newcomers can contribute, it will be an excellent team. They are probably the best team in the West and in CIF D-II, although in both cases La Jolla will give them a spirited battle. The real questions are, how high can they rise at the state level in D-II, and where do they rank with the county's


best teams?



Division: One. Coach: Gary MacDonald, girls; Tony Griswold, boys.


BOYS:






